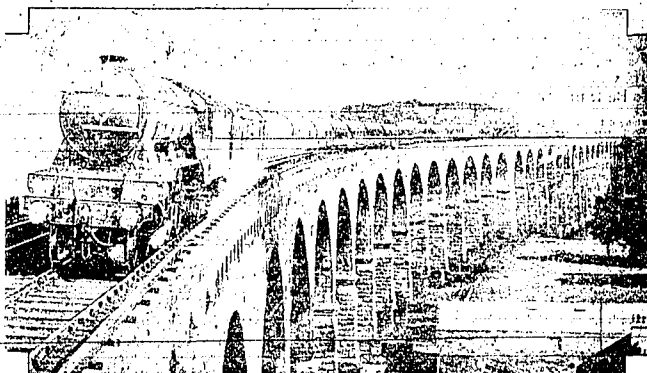

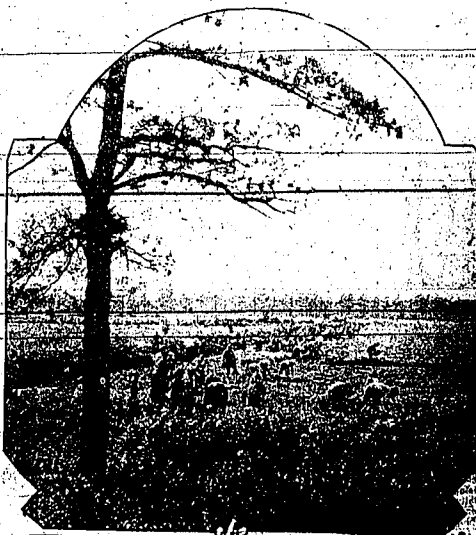

LET'S GET SOME MORE BUSINESS. The state of California particularly the Los Angeles district has become one of the main markets for Idaho farm products and the consumption of fruit, potatoes, grain, etc., in that zone is likely to show material gains over the present level within the next few weeks.

California's like Idaho produce and there is movement in the southern part of the great state toward manufacturing to obtain additional revenue and bring food from Idaho, rather than make extensive agricultural development.

California wants Idaho to buy her manufactured products from local factories and it is anxious that Idaho continue to furnish much of the raw materials for these plants. So interested has California in this connection that she is sending Mr. E. F. MacDonough, domestic trade commissioner of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, to Idaho to spend from Nov. 16 to Dec. 5 in the interest of what California calls trade reciprocity between that state and Idaho.

Idaho is all very well, but why should Twin Falls let all of the factories go to southern California? Is there any reason why dehydrating plants, for instance, should be constructed in southern California, in huckle Idaho produce? If such operation is profitable in California why would it not be much more profitable to Twin Falls? The same is true of fruit processing plants, milk condensing, vinegar works, etc.

California is often condemned as self-centered but the fact remains that California is not content to let well enough alone. That state goes after the business and is in the advertising market up to its neck in Idaho's market. Some of this additional advertising is in this connection, and particularly of the Twin Falls district, can not afford to let all of the industries get away.

This is the third or fourth editorial during the last week in which the Times has urged some action relative to locating new industries here. While this district must, of necessity, remain primarily an agriculture center, something should be done to bring greater diversification of revenue and to end the tremendous waste of products and resources. The plants mentioned above would do much to accomplish this end and the Times will not cease "pleading" for them in that direction. If nothing is accomplished, this newspaper certainly can not have stood idly by.

The suggestion is made here before the leaders of this district and if California can see fit to send one of its best trade experts into this state ostensibly to aid Idaho but really to boost business for the Golden State, certainly the chamber of commerce and other leaders of Twin Falls should at least discuss the matter, which undoubtedly will bring some additional revenue to Twin Falls.

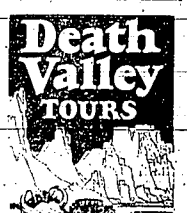

IDAHO APPLE AND POTATO CROPS EXCEED PRODUCTION LAST YEAR

BOISE, Nov. 14.—Idaho's potato crop has increased on an average of 27 bushels per acre on 115,000 acres for a total production of 24,250,000 bushels, according to a statement here today by the United States department of agriculture, division of crop and livestock statistics.

In 1925 the acre yield was 176 bushels on 24,000 acres for a total of 4,300,000 bushels. Quality of the crop in 1927 is only 87 per cent in comparison with 99 per cent last year. A large percentage of number two tubers graded out this year, due to roughness and some sunburn. There was very little field frost. October weather was very favorable for completing maturity and harvest of the tubers. Idaho is the fifth state in importance in potato production, being exceeded by Minnesota, Maine, New York and Washington. In acre yield she ranks second, being topped by Idaho, with 225 bushels per acre. The United States total production of 400,000,000 bushels, an increase of about 5,000,000 million bushels over 1926. The average gain is due to substantial increases in the crops of Maine, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Idaho, Colorado, Washington, Oregon and California. The national average acre yield is 114.5 bushels against 112.7 bushels last year.
