COMING NEARER.

Disarmament is taking on a more tangible aspect. The preparatory commission which will undertake to lay the groundwork upon which an effective disarmament program may be constructed will meet in Geneva Nov. 20. This commission will not be limited to the problem of a general reduction of arms, but to the correlative problems of security and arbitration.

The latest impetus to practical disarmament achievement has been given by Russia in its recently announced decision to participate in the work of the preparatory commission under the auspices of the league of nations. It is the consensus of virtually every dispatch which has emanated from the European chancelleries during the last two weeks that the presence of the soviet at Geneva removes one of the most formidable obstacles to progress of universal disarmament.

Russia, with the population of 130,000,000, its vast potential resources, its standing army estimated between 600,000 and 1,000,000 men, and the uncertainty of its diplomatic relations with other countries, has long been a factor of unknown proportions in the disarmament equation. Whatever attitude Russia may take at the conference, whether it be one of participation or one designed to further its own national military interests, it is generally agreed that the presence of its representatives at Geneva will serve the useful purpose of placing Russia on record.

While the prospects are that a general move for disarmament is under way the fact remains that there is more jealousy and danger of a break now than at any time since the World war. If the powers can overcome this situation, it is agreed that something in the way of disarmament may be accomplished. It may be the matter of every nation wanting to avoid a clash but at the same time preparing for an emergency.

The United States is continuing to lend its support to the league's disarmament efforts, and at the conference late this month every great national power in the world will be represented.

Auto Industry Uses

Air to Carry Chips

Steel shavings and chips which weigh in pounds per cubic foot, are broadly transported and carried away by air as a result of new methods adopted by several leaders in the automobile industry to reduce costs and speed up production.

One of the largest manufacturers of roller bearings in the industry has installed a pneumatic conveyor which carries steel shavings and chips from automatic screw machines to a "chip waster" 500 feet away, and is capable of handling 120,000 pounds during a 10-hour day. The industry before. The need is carried away by creating a tremendous pressure of air driven through the conveyor pipes and into a smaller sized pipe for venting any efficiently direct to public school teachers. To carry away the steel, more than a half million pounds of air are pumped every hour through the conveyors.

Before this system was installed the roller shavings and chips were hauled by trucks through streets and passageways in the buildings. This not only required tracking equipment but a number of men and the time advantage was the loading of oil from the trucks into the floor, which made it impossible to continue over the floor with sawdust so as to prevent accidents. The oil that dripped onto the floor was not as it could not be reclaimed while the pneumatic system in operation all of the oil is recaptured by the conveyors.


