THE CHAMBER'S PROGRAM.

The program outlined at the first meeting of the Erectors of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce Wednesday evening is undoubtedly one of the most extensive ever to be undertaken by an organization in a city of this size. Most of the work is held over as uncompleted, from last year but the general sentiment of the meeting was that considerable action would be taken particularly along the line of obtaining reduced freight rates and establishing new industries here. The "hold over" plans in connection with the new program which will be outlined in the near future undoubtedly will constitute a platform of activity which will keep the officers and directors busy throughout the year and a majority of the points are carried to consummation. Twin Falls will reap much benefit.

One thing which impressed the observers at the meeting Wednesday night was the entire lack of discord among officers and directors. Every one appeared to be working in harmony and if this condition prevails during the year, much good will be accomplished.

Particular interest in Twin Falls citizens are the proposals to bring new industries here, the emphasis for lower freight rates, the opening of the Wells cutoff railway gateway to the east that this area will obtain the benefits which originally prompted the construction of the line, and the establishment of an aviation field here. These projects are vital to this community. Through conversation with various directors the inference was gained that much of the work of the organization will be devoted to these points.

WOMEN MEET

The Modern Womankind of America sponsored a three-meeting at the Hotel Idaho with state-deputy, Mrs. Lillian F. Smith, and district-deputy, Mrs. Paul Smith, of Twin Falls in attendance.

Volunteers of the American Red Cross in Idaho have contributed hundreds of dollars in services during the past five years to the work of their sister organizations, and more contributions are expected, says the report, because those workers found time to make suitable and timely contributions.

Fourteen chapters in the state were engaged in this work, carrying on a diversified program of service. They purchased and distributed 25,000 garments and contributed 19,000 pounds of flour. Throughout the year 19 workers were doing volunteer work in the Red Cross in Idaho.

The work, conducted by volunteers in the United States during the year included the making of 176,000 garments, the preparation of 1,000,000 meals, the distribution of 35,000 packages of foodstuffs, while the Red Cross volunteers' motor corps answered a total of 21,000 calls for aid.
