

U. S. SEIZES \$100,000 FROM PLACER

FOUR BANDITS DIE IN CHAIR FOR SLAYING

All Dramatically Protest Innocence of Killing 70-year-old Paymaster.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Dramatically protesting their innocence, the four notorious "sea crew" bandits were executed in the electric chair at the state prison last night for the murder of George Conitt, 70-year-old paymaster of the Rial Ice Cream company, in Astoria last year. It took less than half an hour for Joseph "Big Joe" Juliano to be the first to die. Then came Christopher Narone, Nicholas "Little Joe" Juliano, brother of "Big Joe," and Louis Capozzi. "Big Joe" was executed in the electric chair at 8 p. m. and Capozzi, the last to die, was pronounced dead at 12:25 p. m.

In their last moments of life, the defendants insisted they were innocent of the killing of Conitt. "I am innocent," according to "Little Joe." "I was framed by the Newark police," declared Capozzi.

As the black mark was being lowered over the eyes of "Big Joe," he exclaimed, "Oh, my mother's honor, I am innocent."

George Conitt, the paymaster, was killed in a holdup on July 19, 1925, by four bandits. One of the bandits, George Duff, escaped with \$12,000.
