### SENATOR BORAH IS RIGHT.

Senator Borah Saturday sounded a note which rings of harmony with a view expressed several times in this column, namely that there is too much controversy over the enforcement of the Eighteenth amendment to the Federal Constitution, more commensurate known as the dry law.

Senator Borah told the delegates at the convention of the National Grange that the Eighteenth amendment either must be enforced or the law stricken from the Constitution.

The Idaho senator said in part: "I would not compromise on this subject in any way, shape or form, but if the time ever comes when it is apparent that the people as a whole do not propose to enforce the Eighteenth amendment, then I would have them take it out of the Constitution as they ought to do."

Senator Borah declared he favored modifying every ounce of power and political attorney in the nation to enforce the prohibition law.

The time certainly appears to be drawing near when there must be a showdown on the dry law, some sort of drastic action to let the law of the states and those who regard it as the law of the land. At present, the prohibition question has become a political football with neither party giving it what might be termed either solid support or solid opposition. The leaders of both parties will say that it is the law and should be enforced and every so often there is a sweeping statement in the prohibition effort here, but the question of absolute enforcement seems to be sort of a community proposition.

As has been stated before, the majority of the citizens are tired of reading "blat" and would like to see some definite action to the end that they may know definitely whether law in this country is law or just talk.

NEVADA ORGANIZATION ASSISTS IN OPENING UP WELLS GATEWAY

Twin Falls Delegates to Land and Livestock Meeting at Elko at End of Week Report on Work Done at the Two Day Session.

It is the belief of the local delegates to the Nevada Land and Livestock association meeting held Saturday at Elko, Nev., that the association will be organized with the Nevada gateway in opening up the Wells gateway. Local delegates who, under the leadership of the local president of the committee of commerce; Newell S. Wight, secretary of the Idaho Wool Growers' association. The group left early Friday for the meeting and returned yesterday.

The Nevada meeting was the annual session of the organization for the purpose of enhancing the interest of land and livestock and considering the problems of range, forestry and water rights. The 17 counties of the state were represented and 120 delegates being present. The Twin Falls representative spoke just before noon Saturday and again at the general Saturday evening. At the latter meeting Mr. McLean spoke on the matter of freight rates while the chairman of commerce delegates talked about the matter of excess freight here.

The convention went on record as favoring the Western Pacific connection at Wells, Nev., and also favoring the feeder in round rate shipping cattle here, feeding them and then shipping them east without transferring the hark through the Nevada state. Newell S. Wight, secretary of the chamber of commerce, had the following to say today regarding the meeting:

"We found a very appreciative group of cattle and sheep men at the Nevada Land and Livestock convention meeting. A number of these gentlemen who are engaged in the business of raising and shipping cattle and sheep in relation to the railroads and their range locations are shipping a number of head of cattle to the Twin Falls country for feeding purposes.

"However, it was evident after discussing the general situation with these men that relations and adjustments of local freight rates in the Nevada territory in connection with southern Idaho will very materially increase the number of head of cattle and sheep sent to the Twin Falls country each year.

"Another fact pointed to us especially significant, it was the general opinion of the delegates that on an average one year in four there occurs a serious drought throughout the entire territory and that the freight schedules can be handled so as to allow free movement of livestock from the Idaho gate to the Nevada gate. This will be secured for 1928 Nevada and Idaho interests.

"The livestock men were, or were unanimous in their opinion that a railroad connection at Wells with the Western Pacific railroad should be made since this will make direct railroad connection with the section of Nevada which under present conditions is entirely shut out of southern Idaho.

"The chairman went on record with strong resolutions and urged the Nevada public service commission to assist in opening up the Wells gateway so that Nevada livestock can move to southern Idaho more freely; also, the physical connection at Wells was warmly urged.

"We discussed the highway situation with Nevada officials it is evident that they are doing everything in their power to speed up proceedings which will result in an agreement of plan and procedure in the construction of the highway from Idaho to Wells and Elko.

"We believe that our delegation established good points of contact at this convention with Nevada officials so that any matters of mutual interest may be more easily taken up in the future.
