Mrs. Snyder and Gray To Die in Chair Jan. 9

Woman Sentenced to Death for Murder of Husband Cries All Night When Informed of Verdict; Lover and Partner in Crime Is Unnamed.

SING SING PRISON, Ossining, N. Y., Nov. 23 (UPI)—Mrs. Josephine Brown visited her daughter, Ruth Brown Snyder, today, a few hours after Mrs. Snyder learned that the week of January 9 she must die in the electric chair.

As Mrs. Brown approached Mrs. Snyder's cell in the death house, Mrs. Snyder stepped forward to meet her. Then she covered her eyes, neither spoke.

OSSINING, N. Y., Nov. 23 (UPI)—Ruth Snyder, her face tattered and hair dyed blonde, knew today that she must die in the electric chair in the second week of January, unless the unexpected happens.

Henry Judi Gray, her partner in the murder of her husband, Albert Gray, too, was resigned and unmoved.

Mrs. Snyder cried most of the night in her cell, prison attaches said, while Gray passed a quiet and restful night.

Both were informed yesterday that the state court of appeals had denied them a new trial and they were sentenced to death. Mrs. Snyder's sentence was more than ever at a loss to know whether Mr. Coolidge is to be tried or declared out of the race.
