Twin Falls Returns Thanks At Union Church Services

'We Ought Not Forget That Thanksgiving in Its Origin Is a Religious Festival,' Says the Rev. C. C. Curtis in Annual Sermon.

"We ought not to forget that Thanksgiving in its origin is a religious festival," said the Rev. C. C. Curtis of the Christian church at the Union Thanksgiving service held at 10:30 a. m. this morning at the Methodist church. "And that the greatest cause for thanksgiving is that relation is as possible to us men and women. It means that human life keeps its dignity and is saved from 'despair.' The highest thought and noblest passion of the soul, are no delusion." The quotation given by the speaker of the service was from the book of the Rev. Hugh Black and related in a recent journal. "The highest expression of our gratitude is shown in the faith by the Rev. Mr. Curtis. Members of the Baptist, Methodist and Presbyterian churches of the city attended the union service, while the members of the churches took part in the exercises.

Music was furnished by a union choir directed by J. T. Husbands. Mrs. Curtis' great kindness.

Continuing, he declared: "According to the fathers, and honored by many people of this country, assembled today by the call of our president, according to the purposes of our several states, that we may join from our many and various activities and employments, and unite our hearts in the same, and extend unto Him a united expression of the gratitude and love, which spontaneously are not in the expression of the gratitude, during our lives and the life of our nation, and especially during the past year, since we last met in this respect."

"As we come today, I trust that we have received more of an insight from the spirit of the day, and that we have been able to see the fact of this national anniversary of the people on this day of general thanksgiving."

"It is at this event, recent from year to year, we are often told that some come from the spirit which suggested the setting apart of such a day. There is scarcely a Thanksgiving season approaches, that we do not hear the expression of the day, as haunting in the extreme to me. 'But what should I give thanks unto, to whom?' It is a question that should ever hear such an expression from a people so blessed an ours."

CHIEF'S DEATH OPENS WAY FOR PRINCE CAROL

Roumanian Premier Dies; Exiled Her Expected to Act Quickly.

It had been hoped that the operation was successful, but blood poisoning developed in the last hours. The immediate question arose of an attempt by former Crown Prince Carol to re-enter the country and seize power. It is generally believed that Carol will do nothing, but the sincere murmur over Bratianu's death, in which even his many bitter enemies join, is a wave.

Then, it is thought, Carol may act. Bratianu had complained of difficulty in breathing, which was caused by throat trouble. An operation was decided upon. The patient followed a surgical operation which was performed last night. Those participating in and in the presence of the king.

It is Sunday. Funeral services will be held Sunday for the former premier, whose body will lie in state at the prince's castle.
