NINETEEN years ago we made and sold the first Model T Ford car. In announcing it to the public we said:

"We will build a motor car for the great multitude. It will be large enough for the family, but small enough for the individual to run and care for. It will be constructed of the best materials, by the best men to be hired, after the simplest designs modern engineering can devise. But it will be so low in price that no man making a good salary will be unable to own one."

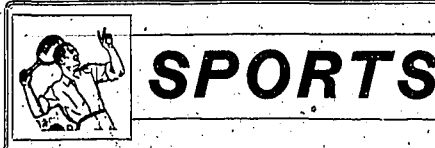

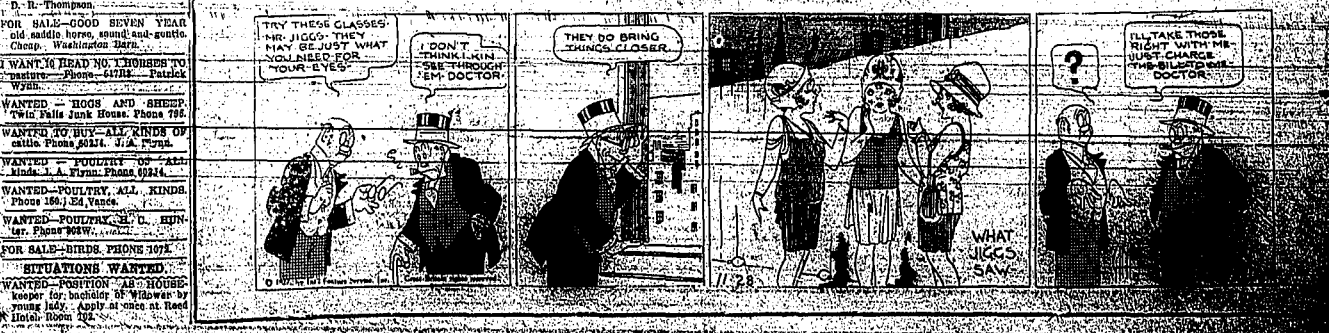

Potato shipments from the state of Idaho for the past four months show a decrease over the corresponding period for last year and an increase over the same four months of 1925. According to Washington, D. C., representative of the bureau of agricultural economics, United States department of agriculture, the following is a summary of the spot situation, there were 1,400 cars shipped from Idaho during the four months of July, August, September and October, as compared with the 634 cars shipped during the same four months of 1925 and the total of 4,542 cars for 1925. The total number of cars shipped during the four months of 1926, 17,222. The previous year the total was 18,271 cars. Much of this year's crop has not yet been shipped.
