WETS SEEKING THREE MILLION REFERENDUM

Want Both Parties to Adopt Plank on National Prohibition Poll.

NEW YORK, Nov. 29.—William H. Clayton, chairman of the Association Against the Prohibition Amendment, announced financial support from \$300,000 to \$500,000 has been given to a \$2,000,000 campaign fund to conduct a national referendum on prohibition.

Clayton spoke at a private dinner sponsored by George W. Whalen, New York broker. Other speakers were Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler, president of Columbia University; former Sen. James W. Aldworth, and former Representative John Philip Hill of Maryland.

While the speeches were not made public, the main points of the main points were stressed. One was held for New York, the same general line as the New York Times, who were overjoyed when they voted their opinion for revision. The second was for the republican party at the 1928 national convention, and the third was for the 1860 one which proposed giving each state the fullest liberty in dealing with its domestic affairs.

It was suggested that a blank calling for a national prohibition referendum be placed in the 1928 platform of both parties. All also wanted to have a plank inserted to be used as a basis for future action.

Wet-Fall-High Fight.

The \$3,000,000 campaign fund would be used to help to get the voters of the high points of the wet arguments.

"If we can have no national referendum, let us have a state referendum in selected states, an acreage vote of \$6,000,000, resembling, say, 25,000,000 votes."

"We plan to have the funds for it to send two letters to each of the 77,000,000 voters in the United States. At five cents a letter, this would cost about \$385,000."

GOOD WORK KEEP IT UP.

More power to California in the purchasing line in view of the statement here last night by Mr. E. F. Hochmuth, trade commissioner of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce before members of the local chamber. Mr. Hochmuth said that the Los Angeles district spent approximately \$12,000,000 in Idaho last year for food and predicted that the outlay would greater than year.

Senator Robertson said that the question should be taken out of politics and approached from the standpoint of doing the greatest good for the greatest number. Sound logical and is at least worthy of consideration.

In any event, action would seem to be the most important item and The Times would like to see a large amount of the necessary movement.
