Jennings Paroled While Greer Gets One to 14 Years

Good Record Brings Parole to Baby Youth Who Figured in Car Theft

Lawyer How and Secured in Prisons in Utah.

One of 14 years in the state penitentiary was the punishment given Edna Greer, 19, Twin Falls, by Judge H. P. Hanson in his decision this morning for the theft of Edna Jones' automobile here this fall. Greer, Jennings, 20, who was an associate of Greer's in the theft of the car, was because of his past clean record, released on parole to his father, Richard Jennings, brother-in-law of the two and one-half miles from here.

Jennings appeared before Judge Hanson first and received a straight-forward sentence. His father, who presented his application for parole, subject to the conditions that Richard Jennings request monthly on the part of the boy, that the youth keep out of pool halls and gambling places and that he remain away from bad company.

Must Pay Costs.

Both Greer and Jennings are to pay the costs of their arraignment. The house youth is to turn one-half of his earnings over to Sheriff M. E. Pugh until his bond has been made. It was necessary to go to Martinez, Cal., where they were arrested, to get them for trial.

When the judge called on Greer he explained to him that the case was much different than that of Jennings. He told the baby, who maintains he is 19, that he had a bad record, that he was not a first-time offender at the age of 12, that he had had bad sentences in Utah and had worked time in the state penitentiary of Utah, beginning in Dec. 1923, and that at one time he escaped from jail in that state.

Greer Makes Deal.

Greer denied knowledge of a grand larceny case now pending against him in Utah, said that the different first names under which he was arrested were mistaken on the part of the court and denied that he had failed to support his wife and child, which is a charge that his wife has accused him in juvenile court here some time ago.

Wife Escapes Run-down the Road

Greer was 11 years in the state penitentiary at hard labor, transferred to the state penitentiary at Pocatello by working in the local dehydrating plant, and in the year of 1923 the 17-year-old boy took the judgment without a trial of conviction turned over to Sheriff Finch to be placed in custody until he is sent to Blaine to begin serving his term.

Both men pleaded not guilty when arraigned. After a preliminary hearing Kelly was released in probate court because of insufficient evidence. A preliminary hearing held Nov. 16 after Snowden was released from the hospital where he had been recovering from a preliminary hearing in Snowden's being held to answer in connection with the case.

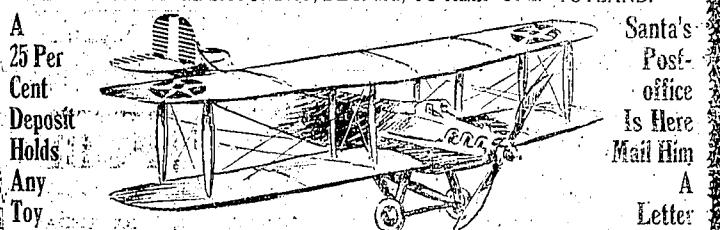
