**Independents Are Victorious in Winning Several Choice Appointments.**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12.—Peace in the republican ranks of the senate was assured today when a party conference ratified the recommendations of the committee on recommendations.

**LEAGUE HAPPY ON PEACE TURN**

Dangerous Polish-Lithuanian Situation Is Settled Without Resort to War.

GENEVA, Dec. 12.—The league of nations council adjourned today until March, after having mediated a dangerous seven-year dispute between Poland and Lithuania over the territory of Vilna.

Before the adjournment today the council agreed up several million dollars to help the refugees who were thinking of leaving for home, because of the "great victory" of the council in liquidating a dispute that only a fortnight ago threatened the possibility of immediate hostilities.

Under an agreement effected by the league, Poland and Lithuania will now be represented on the technical state of war that had existed between them since Poland's seizure of Vilna in 1920, and were to begin negotiations.

This dispute over possession of Vilna continues, and must be settled separately; but the problem has been transferred to the sphere of politics from that of potential war.

**Mystery Veils Death of Veteran Film Actor**

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 12.—Mystery surrounds the death of George Melford, 54, veteran film actor and former grand opera player, who was to be buried yesterday in his son's crypt in Forest Lawn Cemetery.

When the body was being let down made for the funeral, two women on whom became ill after drinking part of a pot of coffee from which Melford participated in reports, said they were shocked to find that the woman was missing from protection against threatened Moro attack.

## REQUESTS OF BEN FRANKLIN.

When William Stelleman of Holland, Mich., deposited \$1 recently at 8 per cent to be compounded semi-annually for 50 years, with the hope that there would then be \$290,000,000 to be divided among his descendants, he was following an example set by Benjamin Franklin.

"Poor Richard," America's most noted sage of thrift, started two compound interest funds 137 years ago with 1,000 pounds (\$3,000) each—one in Boston and the other in Philadelphia. These funds still are in existence.

On his death in 1790 Franklin, by a long will, left a long will directed that these moneys be let out at interest at 5 per cent "to such young married artificers under the age of 25 years as have served an apprenticeship in the said towns and faithfully fulfilled the duties required."

"If this plan, referring to the artificers' loans is executed and spreads as projected without interruption for 100 years," wrote Franklin, "the sum will then be \$13,000 pounds (\$35,000)."

One hundred thousand pounds or \$300,000, this he directed, "not to be laid out in public works which may be judged of the most general utility to the inhabitants—fortifications, bridges, aqueducts, public buildings, parks, etc.—or whatever may be deemed best for the town or country wherein it is placed, and rendering it more available to strangers resorting thither for health or a temporary residence."

"The remaining 31,000 pounds (\$15,500) is to be continued let at interest for another 100 years," continued Franklin, "as I hope it will have been found that the institution has had a good effect on the conduct of youth and been of service to many worthy characters and useful citizens."

"At the end of this second term, if no unfortunate accident has prevented the operation, the sum will be \$4,061,000 pounds sterling (\$12,000,000) of which I leave \$1,000,000 to the disposition of the inhabitants of the town of Boston and 3,000,000 pounds (15 million dollars) to the disposition of the government of Massachusetts, not presuming to carry my benevolence further."

Similar provision was made for the growth and disposition of the Philadelphia fund of \$5,000. The first 100 years ended in 1890. Instead of each of these funds amounting to \$300,000, the Philadelphia fund had then only \$77,000, while the Boston fund, although it had been further in realizing the anticipations of the testator, was but \$168,000.
