SAYS HE WOULD MAKE DIVORCES EASIER TO GET

LONDON—Said Justice Maclean, chief justice of the High Court, in the case of Sir Edward Jarry, Metropolitan county court judge, as his contribution to the march of modern times.

Said Justice in a trial of marriage first of all, and a remedy rather than a divorce, Judge Jarry explained his ideas on the way modern divorce suits could be rendered by a slot machine, he declared.

"At Leeds, not long ago, the lord chief justice of England called attention in a case to the fact that the total waste of time, money and valuable human energy in the so-called trials of undefended divorce petitions. Having heard 50 cases, in which some formal proof of similar equal results was rattled through, that the words of the statute might be fulfilled, the saying is, his lordship is expected to have said:

Sir Edward is in favor of rapid divorce procedure.

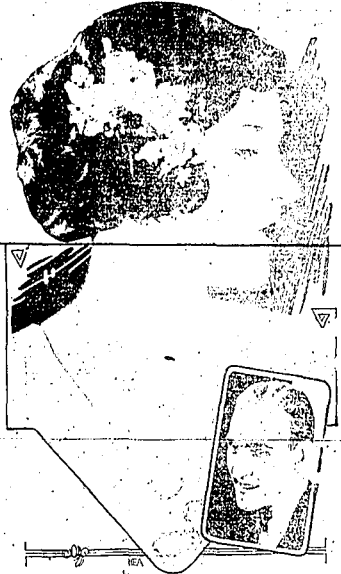
In defense of his theory, Sir Edward says:

SAYS INDUSTRY KILLING ITSELF

LEWISBURG, Pa.—American industrialists are poisoning their own destruction by the financial destruction of agriculture, Sir David Steel, prominent British financier, declared in an interview here after his return from a study of conditions in the United States.

"The economic balance between agriculture and industry in America is going to prove," he said, "agriculture is expected to be able to buy the industry what it desires. As an available commodity, agriculture will soon prove to be able to supply the industry with what industry needs."

The agricultural needs long-term credit at low rates of interest, not only as the industrial needs his long term credit, but the financial system in the United States stands for agriculture, exacting heavy toll for its mortgages and loans of sums necessary for a cross of the value of the agricultural industry.

"The farmer," he continued, "desires that natural processes intended conform to his financial wishes. In the manufacturing industries, he is usually standing industry at its peak and preparing an industrial collapse in which the financial wreckage will be appalling."

The flow of liquor in Linnada was kept at a minimum for a time with the addition of county officers in the village police force, but recently the traffic has broken out anew. Village officers say they are willing to cooperate but add that it's impossible to arrest half the town. County officers have federal authorities handle the situation.

It really makes very little difference whether Jimmy Slattery of Buffalo or Tommy Loughran of Philadelphia is known as light heavyweight champion of the world, except, perhaps, to those gentlemen and those who want tickets to their fights.

A couple of other tick fillets will be at stake in Madison Square Garden this week.

Ted Morgan, who has had the honor of light heavyweight crown about long enough will defend it for the second or third time. It will not even be long, against Joe Glick, the well-known New York Heavyweight.

SCORES FOOLISH SAWDUST WASTE

WASHINGTON (United Press) - The lumbermen in following in the United States, the largest most-energetic wood mill utilized even the scrap of the pile, but he must develop even more means to take care of the surplus. Millions of tons of sawdust are now burned annually in the United States, some for fuel and some wasted, while the surplus is imported from Europe as fuel products. Director Axel H. Oshorn of the national wood utilization committee, pointed out that a recent survey of lumber men for sawdust which develop up to per cent of every saw log.

The annual production if consolidated would be several times that of the United States, and the surplus, the bulkiness, preventing transportation for considerable distances, is one of the principal obstacles to full utilization, he pointed out.

His Many Uses
 Including manufacture of dynamite, dolly, cotton woolpaper, and artificial wool to replace the wool that is so-called is "non-bleeding wool" and an "artificial" wool.

Wood waste has been used by a grinding process, that of the early wood-pulp mills, is the important wood waste which the United States now imports from foreign countries in millions. This product is used in making dynamite to the extent of 700,000 tons a year. More than 1,000 tons a year is used by the manufacturer of rayon.

"Although the United States possesses a greater variety of raw materials for making wood waste than other countries, we are still importing over one-fifth of our total requirements," Oshorn said.

Most used for fuel, but the mills produce more than is needed for their own use, which is converted into liquid products, different in nature from fuel products, one by one a year for packing their fruit for shipment.

Wood waste is used in tanning, metal-working and for industries for cleaning purposes. Most people are familiar with the use of wood waste in the form of insulation. Wood-makers spend it over cement to facilitate tiling.
