SAYS HE WOULD MAKE DIVORCES EASIER TO GET

LAWRENCE, KAN.—(UPI)—The restriction of undivided shares would be to the suggestion of Sir Edward Parry, Metropolitan county court judge, as the contribution to the march of modern times.

Seeing divorce as a threat of marriage more than a remedy rather than a disease, Judge Parry explained yesterday that he believed no single person could have upon this institution

"most damage caused in undivided stock than a man who is restricted by a stock machine," he declared.

"At Louis, not long ago, the lord chief justice of England called attention in caustic terms to the utter waste of time, money and human energy in the so-called trials of undivided divorce petitions. Having heard 20 cases, in which some-thing like a similar question of title was raised through the thin walls of the statute might be fulfilled, as the saying is, he concluded it reported to him."



THE ADVISORY BOARD MEETING.

Every farmer, stockman, business man and shipper in the Inter-mountain district should be vitally interested in the conference here tomorrow of the Central Western Shippers' Advisory Board.

The district includes Colorado, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho and two counties in Oregon, and Nebraska and the cities of Council Bluffs and Sioux City.

The shippers' advisory board is the medium or principal figure in bringing order out of chaos in railroad transportation. Not many years ago many citizens of Idaho almost froze to death due to a shortage of fuel, which, in turn, was brought about by a lack of cars at mines. Almost everyone remembers the winter of 1916 when the Oregon Short Line, in many instances, moved carloads of coal on regular passenger trains to alleviate suffering. During that same winter and the next spring damage running into millions was caused by shortages of car equipment.

This year the shipments from the Twin Falls district broke all records and virtually the same conditions applied in other areas. There was no shortage of cars, except for three or four days, and that was largely due to a lack of movement, according to authority in the industry.

The satisfactory condition has been brought about, in large degree, by the advisory board.

Representatives of the shippers, of course, in the districts keep accurate check of production and figure out time and place of shipment. These figures are transmitted to the inter-branch railroads, and their representatives immediately begin arranging for the furnishing of cars at needed points at the time needed. The old battle over requirements and supply of cars has gone forever; it is believed.

The advisory board has brought about systematic loadings and unloadings which have taken the place of the old haphazard system. Now, freight cars travel three times faster in a day than they traveled 10 years ago. The result of this new area of cooperation has been that the railroads now handle a tremendous gain in freight with a very small increase in car equipment. Freight trains of 100 cars now are as common as trains of 45 cars were 10 years ago and just about as numerous.

Undoubtedly, however, the biggest result of the activities of the advisory board is the better understanding between the railroads and the shippers. Of course, the battle for lower rates very likely will continue to some degree but that has nothing in particular to do with efficient operation and co-operation in the movement of crops and products.

Among the speakers at the session, Wednesday will be such nobles as G. W. H. C. Bridgeman, of Idaho; C. C. Calvin, president of the Union Pacific System, and bankers, shippers and railroad operating officials. Their messages will, without doubt, promote more efficiency in transportation which will cause further mutually beneficial results.

This Bread Became Valuable With Age

CHUBBUCK—Ninety-four thousand seven hundred and forty-five old, a loaf of bread found in a medieval dungeon in France.
