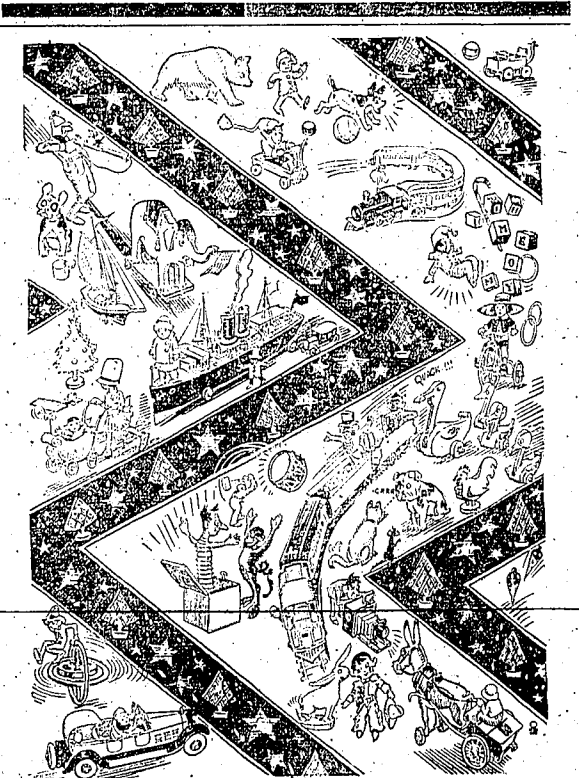

OF COURSE, CERTAINLY.

For a few hours yesterday it seemed that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh had made an error and had either missed Mexico entirely or that he had been added to the long list of long distance flight victims. However, Lindy put in an appearance at Mexico City just when a search for him was about to be started, received a number of the wild receptions of which he has grown weary, shook hands with another president and Will Rogers, who was in the grandstand at Mexico City with President Calles and United States Ambassador Morrow and then went to dinner.

Lindbergh's official time for the 2,100-mile flight from Washington to Mexico City was 27 hours and 13 minutes. During part of that time he was lost and, coming out the morning after deriving around over the Mexican desert, he probably made the trip in approximately 21 to 25 hours.

More than 25,000 people waited with President Calles and the Mexican cabinet for Lindbergh's arrival. About 1 p. m. many became discouraged and left but there was a wild rush for the field when the Spirit of St. Louis came roaring over the horizon shortly after 2 and when it arrived over the field at 2:30, Lindy took nine minutes to pick an opening in the crowd on the field which had broken through the police lines, and came to ground at 2:39 p. m.

The great demonstration for Lindbergh yesterday and those which he will receive in other Mexican cities undoubtedly will be the medium for restoration of full relations between the United States and Mexico. All of the world has a hero and Lindbergh's popular appeal to the always enthusiastic spirit of the Mexicans very likely will cause the citizens of the southern republic to forgive and forget much in connection with the relations of the United States with Mexico.

Turner Is Held on Liquor Count

Illegal Possession Complaint Filed Following Raid Last Night.

A complaint charging illegal possession of liquor was filed at midnight yesterday against Frank Turner, who was arrested about 9 p. m. yesterday in a raid on his residence at 525 Main avenue west. Lester Pettibone, who was arrested at the same time, is the defendant but no charge had been filed this afternoon. Authorities stated today that three officers armed with a warrant last night were near the house. They reported that they saw a man enter the house and the light in the kitchen was turned out. As they forced their way into the building, the officers sold they saw a woman throw a gallon jar, which had been on the floor, into the stove. The contents of the jar exploded and flames leaped from the stove ignited. Found on the floor were bottles overturned by Turner, his wife and Pettibone, filling the room with flames. A neighbor, seeing the fire, turned in a fire alarm and the blaze was soon extinguished. The three men were

taken to the police station, where Turner and Pettibone were detained while the third man, whose name of Peter is referred to officially, was released. LOWERING SPUD STANDARDS IS CAUSE OF THE PRESENT PRICE

R. L. Spangler, Representative of State Chamber of Commerce to Chicago, Deplores Present Decrease in Potato Quality.

BOISE, Dec. 15.—The lowering of their standards by Idaho potato growers is the cause for the low price on the market for Idaho potatoes. R. L. Spangler, representative of the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce, who has conducted an investigation of the market for Idaho potatoes on the Pacific coast this fall and who has now completed a survey of the Chicago market, has found after an investigation of the Chicago market, that there are two causes for the low price of Idaho potatoes. One is that a large number of them are being shipped than that market can consume and the other is that they are being shipped in unmarked containers. He finds that Idaho shipments are actually to Chicago on an average over twice as many potatoes this year as were consumed last year. In fact, following is the detailed report on the Chicago market made by Mr. Spangler:

"Probably the main topic of discussion between Idaho potato growers and the Chicago market is the low price of Idaho potatoes and why are the 'inferior' Wisconsin potatoes so much higher than Idaho. No doubt would exist in the mind of any Idaho shipper or anyone else on the Chicago market. After studying the problem of the distribution and the quantity of the products which they are trying to distribute, he could not help but attribute the low price of Idaho potatoes to the fault of the distributor that Idaho potatoes are selling at a price on a level with Wisconsin potatoes."

"I certainly regret to report on some that Idaho shippers have lowered their quality standards. In a year or two of the present potato crop in history, the average number of tubers nearly 400,000,000 bushels. It is difficult to understand the state and the market, which would lower their standards. This is one year above all in which only the highest quality No. 1 and No. 2 have been placed on the market. If this had been done, Idaho potatoes would have sold at a price of \$1.65 per cwt. as top price on the Chicago market."

There are two main reasons for the low price of Idaho potatoes. The first is that there are more potatoes than the market can consume and the second is that they are being shipped in unmarked containers. Reports of the Chicago market during this period have shown an increase over last year of 25 cars per day, while last year the average was only 10 cars per day, thus showing a 25-car increase per day over last year.

In 1924 Idaho unloaded 110,000 cars, in 1925, 1926, and in 1926, 29,500 cars were shipped. On the other hand, Wisconsin unloaded 472 cars in 1926 last year, thus making her consumption about twice that of Idaho. During these last few weeks Wisconsin has been rolling on an average of about 20 cars a day to Chicago, making it another way, Wisconsin, whose consumption on the Chicago market, is nearly double that of Idaho potatoes, is rolling about half as many potatoes daily to Chicago as Idaho.

"Some Idaho shippers will argue that they cannot afford to put their potatoes in marked containers in the face of such market prices, but had our shippers marked their potatoes in Wisconsin containers, the price would never have gone down to \$1.45 for top grade. If it had remained at \$1.45 per cwt. once it had been established, but I do feel that the balance of the Idaho potato crop could be marketed at a profit if the shippers will adopt the policy of sending only top grade potatoes in attractive brand containers, and will curtail their shipments to the market demands. It is certainly more reasonable to sell part of our output at a profit than to sell the entire crop at a loss. If our shippers could only sell their 100,000,000 bushels of potatoes at a profit, it would be a great thing for them. It is certainly high time that Idaho shippers of potatoes learned that quality behind it. Being so far away from our markets it is absolutely necessary that we pack a superior product in order to compete with the other states. Until our shippers and growers learn that consumers are going to pay the price of bearing it, it will not be profitable."

"Chicago is one of the best outlets for Idaho potatoes. Each year our production is increasing, we find a corresponding increase in our exports. Fifteen carloads of Idaho potatoes were unloaded in 1924, 57 in 1925 and 117 last year."

"The quality this year is not up to standard largely due to poor weather conditions for proper maturity. There is a large per cent of breakdown in the tubers and a large per cent of the tubers are being sold at a loss. It is certainly high time that Idaho shippers of potatoes learned that quality behind it. Being so far away from our markets it is absolutely necessary that we pack a superior product in order to compete with the other states. Until our shippers and growers learn that consumers are going to pay the price of bearing it, it will not be profitable."

446 Cows Tested During November

A total of 446 cows were tested during the month of November, according to the report of W. J. Lyons of the Pioneer Cow Testing Association, made here yesterday afternoon. These cattle were in 28 herds. The testing of the herds revealed 41 cows producing 40 pounds of milk in the average and 22.6 pounds of fat per cow. The average number of pounds of butterfat and 254 pounds of milk in the herds.

The high herd in the small herd for the month was owned by George and Mrs. J. J. Peterson and four animals averaged 32.1 pounds of butterfat and 254 pounds of milk in the herds.

Walker of Hanson was high, the average milk averaging 42.2 pounds of fat and 711 pounds of milk. In the large herd class the group of 21 animals owned by Whitt Iron, of Twin Falls, were high, producing an average of 26.4 pounds of butterfat and 254 pounds of milk.

THE PERILS OF PROFESSIONALISM

Apparently the German athletic authorities were not ill-informed in their opposition to Dr. Otto Peltzer's visit to this country.

Before the noted middle distance runner had so much as set foot upon American soil, he encountered one of those snare, which occasionally entrap the many amateur and turn him into a perfectly terrible professional with whom good little athletes no longer may associate.

When Peltzer arrived, he was met aboard the North German Lloyd liner by a group of journalists, including one of his own race, who obtained from him an "exclusive photograph" of the doctor in running shoes, tripping on the deck of the boat. This photograph, according to the testimonials of other reporters, the German Journalist promptly offered for sale, amounting \$50 as the price.

Now had such a sale been made, the finger of suspicion must inevitably have swung around to the direction of Dr. Peltzer. Amateurs may be many things, but collaborating in the sale of their photographs is forbidden. Realizing the danger, the Journalist announced later that he had not allowed to sell the photograph, adding that "anyway, Peltzer knew nothing about it."

Nothing came of the incident, of course, but it was a close shave. It is, to say the least, an auspicious start for the German athlete's American visit.

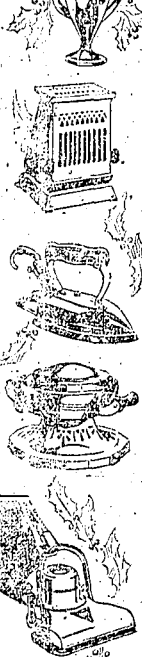

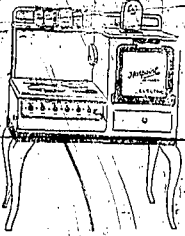

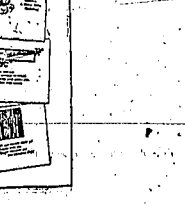
