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MALTZAN GEMS SAID TO HAVE CERTAIN MIRACULOUS POWERS

Famous String of Pearls Are Claimed to Bring Good Fortune but Presage Tragedy by Becoming Discolored; Many Legends.

Once more the famous von Maltzan pearls are said to have changed color—this time in connection with the recent tragic death of Baron Arco von Maltzan, German ambassador to the United States. The string of pearls, a family heirloom, is popularly supposed to possess extraordinary powers, its function being to bring good fortune, but also to presage tragedy by becoming discolored.

It is strikingly recalled many legends about famous jewels that have been thought to hold mysterious powers. Some time immemorial superstitions have endowed themselves about all powers of good and evil and precious stones except over those who own them.

The legend about the von Maltzan pearls has the appearance of defying all scientific explanation. It was in the sixteenth century that the pearls came into the possession of the von Maltzan family, in the ancestral home of Maltzan, in the first year, on the title held, had been born to the baroness Eva, known von Maltzan. The daughter in which the mother and her baby were being was lifted daily by a white cloth which was held at the corners of the room in golden shrouds. Some time after midnight a sudden knock loudly entered the room and awakened the baroness.

"The Gullin Legend," the Gullin had a newborn child," the legend told, "and the old from this lamp is the light of the sun. The Gullin said, 'Will you please put the lamp in your other hand?' So the baroness moved the lamp to the other hand and looked for it and vanished. A few days later he returned and had a string of pearls on the Gullin's neck."

"Because of your kindness, I give you this present," he said. "The pearls are said to be the pearls of Maltzan, as long as their order is maintained and they are not changed, or sold, or damaged, or if one of the pearls should be lost, the family will be a member of the family will die."

The family prospered, but in 1616, on the last day, the von Maltzan pearls were sold to the other members of the family, and all the pearls were made of, and all in one spot to find out. Then the Gullin's words came true: "An evil deed shall be done, and the pearls of the castle crumbled and five persons were killed."

In 1859 a woman member of the family who owned the pearls needed money and offered them for sale to the manufacturer of the late ambassador. He bought them, but immediately changed his mind and sold them to a man who was the evil eye. This late ambassador, some years earlier in America, talked of selling the pearls, but he sold his pearls, and he had intended, Baron Arco was skeptical about the swirling, but finally gave up his idea. The next day, when he met his uncle, who owned the pearls, he found him dressed in mourning.

"I didn't tell you yesterday why I didn't want you to go riding," he said, "because you would have laughed at me. But I have just taken the pearls out of the safe, and one of them had turned black, and you would be afraid you would be killed if you rode. Last night, however, I received a telegram announcing the death of your cousin in Bordeaux."

There are probably 10 or 20 American boxers who could become heavy-weight champion of Great Britain by the simple expedient of getting on a boat and going to London.

In fact, if Phil Scott knew they were there, he might be tempted not to return himself.

Phil, the Hackney Wick fire lad who led the best card flat to try his luck among the British heavyweights, has learned by his own experience that the dreams of conquest, which began one day at Wembley Stadium, are not coming true.

On the day in question, Phil was among four British boxers selected to go on a one-minute round each with Jack Dempsey; who, at the time, was champion of the world.

In a dignified little speech to the crowd, Dempsey complimented British boxing and said that perhaps he would some day be meeting the British champion in a battle for the world's title.

"You know, that's right," said Phil to his handlers. "When I get in there I shall jolly well do my best. If I see an opening I shall not hold back." Perhaps if I can knock out Phil I shall be champion of the world. Who knows?
