### West Point Refuses to Accede to Annapolis Demand for Barring Stars and Most Colorful Annual Grid Clash is Thing of Past.

NEW YORK, Dec. 17.—After 28 years of intimate relations the Army and the Navy, West Point military academy and the Naval Academy at Annapolis, have severed relations.

The two schools last night decided to end the football relations which annually resulted in one of the most colorful games of the entire football season. Last season the game drew 75,000 people at the Yankee stadium. The preceding year 100,000 people watched the game at Soldiers Field in Chicago.

The technical reason involved is over eligibility. Both schools for years have used players who had played in the college before entering the academies. Last season Harry Wilson was captain of the Army team. He played three years in college before entering the military academy and was an All-American back there.

Earlier in the season the Navy decided to enforce the regulation. The Army has refused to accede to the Navy's demand for barring stars and most colorful annual grid clash is thing of past.
