HYPED DIM FOR 40 IN U-BOAT

Woman May Be 'Key' in Brutal Murder of Girl

STRONG CLEWS ARE FOUND IN FIEND CRIME

Suspect Nabbed Near Place Victim's Body is Dumped; Find Blood Stains.

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 19.—Police believed today they had taken the first definite step toward solving the brutal murder of Marion Parker, the 19-year-old banker's daughter, with the arrest of a young woman who was booked on a charge of suspicion of murder.

The man-hunt, in which more than 5,000 Los Angeles policemen were engaged, resulted in the arrest of dozens of suspects during the night. In addition to the Parker case, other men were booked on suspicion of murder.

The men are Ouyfory Bernama, who was trapped after he called radio station and said he was "the for" and William Lutz, who was connected with the arrest of the woman suspect.

Long was taken into custody when police raided a house two doors from the place where the mutilated body of Marion was returned to her father.

Police made the raid after they had watched the suspicious actions of a man who parked an automobile in the rear of the house. Mrs. Parker was arrested in the front yard of the same house. Police suspicion was first directed to the man through a woman's apparent intoxicated condition. Later the manner in which the automobile had been parked from the rear of the house was thought suspicious.

After Long had been questioned at length he was released, but after further questioning he was assigned to keep close watch on him.

Police bloodstains revealed a newly washed towel, not quite free of bloodstains, and footprints in the mud.

These "discoveries" together with the fact that the murderer had been watched Parker approach the appointed meeting place and make sure that she was not followed, all pointed out, however, that it was entirely circumstantial.

Search of the house revealed the necessity of the ransom note to the house. The kidnaper, diving from the alley in the rear of the house, could have met Parker, collected the money, dragged over the body and returned to his garage by traveling less than half a block, and by being out less than five minutes.

The controversy between groups of the Church of England is to say the least, resulting in no good for that or other denominations. To add to this fact that the house of commons of Great Britain refused to approve changes in the church's book of prayer, there is created a combination of church, state and politics that can only cause disgust to many members of the Church of England and others.

The 70-year-old Archbishop of Canterbury, who is reported to have labored for 21 years to revise the ancient book of prayer (it was promulgated in 1661) is declared to be near collapse from sorrow brought on by the status of affairs. To aggravate the difficulties there now is reported a movement to split the church between the so-called "low church" and "high church."

The proposed book of prayer sought to smooth over the trouble between the groups by authorizing alternative communion services and this service was the real cause of the trouble. One service would have been roughly corresponding to that of most Protestant churches. The other was a concession to "high churchmen" who form the Anglo-Catholic party, and who favor reunion with the Roman Catholic church.

The trouble will serve only one purpose and that is to cause more distrust that churchmen the world over admit is growing in the mind of the "man on the street" for churches in general.

Religious strife should cease. No good is being accomplished, and certainly a vast amount of harm is daily resulting from splits, disagreements and open quarrels between groups within churches and between the various denominations. There is enough misery in the world. The work of all churches should be to alleviate suffering as much as possible and to create a desire in the heart of every man to trust and worship the Creator in such a way that he will be assured of a life of peace and joy in the hereafter.

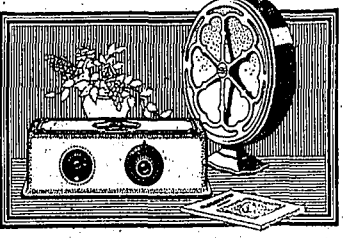

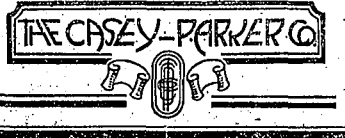

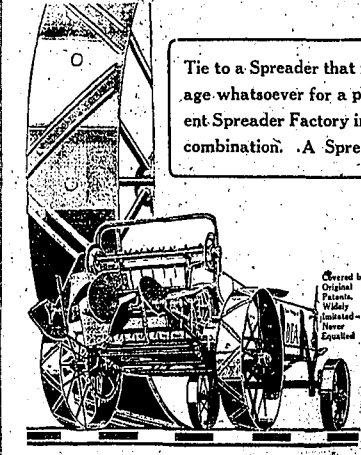

There have been indications that an attempt will be made to amend the Walsh resolution. Senator Moses, Republican, New Hampshire, proposed its adoption when it was introduced Saturday. He suggested it should be referred to the interstate commerce committee for preliminary investigation to determine whether a complete investigation is warranted.

The value of business in Twin Falls for the latest month available at the time the report was compiled was \$2,222,000. The trend of business as reported by the report for Boise was good and Pocatello fair. The total percentage computed on the three latest months for the state as compared with a year ago are: August, 102; September, 99; October, 108. The total value of business for the state was \$29,920,000.

The expectation of business for Idaho, the only city in Idaho listed in that table, for the months of December, January, February and March, as compared with the 100 for the same months last year, follows for the four months respectively: 100, 100, 100, 110. The total for the United States for the same months are: 105, 110, 120, 115.

For the entire state of Idaho, the report shows the sale of real estate, stamps as being in the best favorable class; building activity on value of contracts awarded, more favorable; retail hardware sales, fair; Michigan construction, best favorable; sale of gasoline, most favorable; sale of life insurance, least favorable; bank deposits, third quarter, fair; business failures, least favorable; iron and steel production, compared with year ago most favorable.

Within the state, Twin Falls and Boise are marked as cities offering relatively the most favorable conditions, while Pocatello is rated as fair in sales opportunities.
