WILL THEY ASK MERCY HERE? Citizens of California have pledged cash rewards totaling \$100,000 for the arrest of the arch fiend just week kidnaped Marion Parker 12 years old, from her class room in a Los Angeles school and who Saturday night threw his mutilated body from an automobile near her home. When the child "was brought back" to her father, the boys had eyes out from the body, wire was twisted around the throat, the ends of which were wound around the head and pushed through the eyelids.

The father went to the place designated by the "fox," as the killer has been branded, with \$3,000 ransom money that had been demanded. An automobile drove alongside of his and he saw little Marion who had been missing for three days, apparently sitting beside her abductor. The latter told the father to give him the \$3,000, which he did and was ordered to follow the other machine closely. After they had gone about 200 feet the kidnaper threw the body to the boulevard and drove rapidly away. The father, who believed Marion was under the influence of an anesthetic, rushed forward and eluded her in his arms only to find her dead. Further examination disclosed the previously described condition.

Now, 5,000 officers are searching for the murderer (that appellation really is too modest) and have several clues which they hope will lead to his capture. With public sentiment keyed to a high point in connection with the huge rewards it is considered certain that the killer will be taken. Then will come his argument and trial.

The big question at this time is just what will be the fate of the child. Inevitably undoubtedly will be the plea. The state will demand the death penalty and then will come the rush by those opposed to capital punishment, delays will result, columns will be published about profits, etc., and eventually the murderer may receive a life sentence. This is what he in prospect if the slightest head is given to those who cry "mercy."

Drastic action is needed in this case. Unless the man is a savage mauler, and such is not possible in view of his telephone conversations, wording of the ransom letters and his driving of an automobile, he should be put to death in less than a week after he is captured, if he is.

The Times often has declared in these columns that the way to decrease crime is to take action fitting the deed. In the brutal murder of little Marion Parker the state has an opportunity to set an example of justice by putting the "Fox" to death. This will also tend to decrease "insanity," the so-called victims of which will hesitate to "lose" their minds when they find that they really must be insane to escape the chair or the noose.

In any event, millions of mothers and fathers join Mr. and Mrs. Parker of Los Angeles, in the hope that the murderer will be made to pay the full penalty of the law.

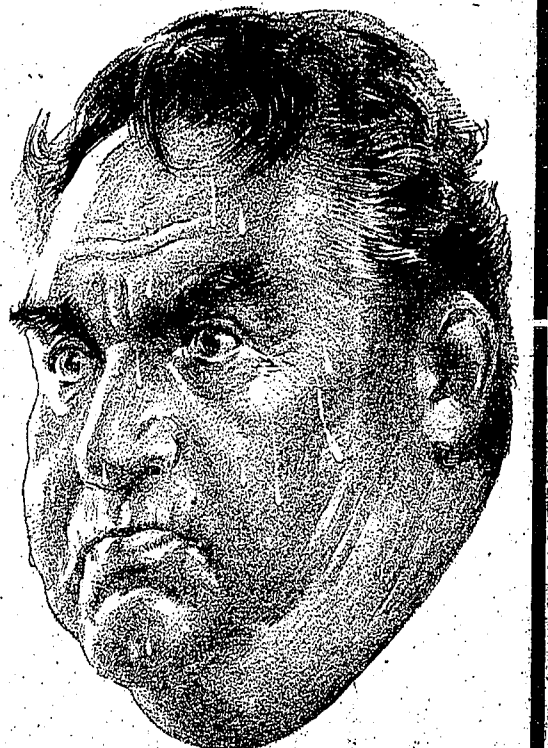

A big crowd of young people were ice skating at the Deep Creek dam Sunday afternoon. There were a good many there from Rogerson and Hollister.

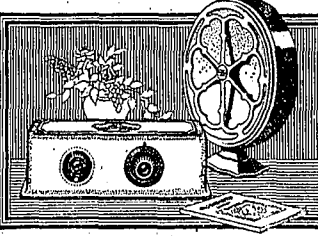

Jones is known as "Snake Charmer" because he has watched the writhing creatures, man and animal, and know when they are 40% or less of the color of their own."

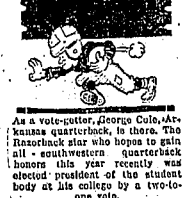
