## DIVERS WORK TO RAISE THE SUNKEN BOAT

Tests of Air Taken From S-4 Show It to Be Deadly Fuel and Poisonous.

PROVIDENCE, Dec. 22.—Admiral J. H. Brumby, in charge of salvage operations at the scene of the disaster, today said he had observed all hope of finding anyone alive aboard the sunken ship but that the salvage operation would continue.

LITTLE ROCK, Dec. 22.—The navy fought valiantly today in its effort to raise the sunken submarine S-4 and recover from its 40 officers and men, imprisoned, drowned or suffocated within the hull.

At daybreak, after a few hours' rest, the 12 divers aboard the mine sweeper, Polaris, resumed their operations and, one after another, took their turns in going down to the spot 100 feet below the water's surface, where the S-4 rests.

Air pumps continued through the morning, forcing air down through the small opening in the floating tube of the submarine, which made into the hull, where all men are believed to have died of asphyxiation. Tests of the air, however, showed it to be non-poisonous. None could live in it long. Efforts were also directed toward securing the air with the idea of raising it with pumps.

William Wickwire, diver who was in charge of the operations, was resumed yesterday, spent an hour surveying the S-4 this morning. When his name was James Wickwire, he was discharged to make measurements for air attaching chains to the sunken ship.

Operations were favored by clear, calm weather and rising temperatures. The S-4 rested in only about four feet of water. Wickwire reported that he was not sufficient to hamper divers in placing bottom chains.

Wickwire went down for 8 a. m. and remained on the bottom for a little more than an hour. He reported in no way fatigued. He said he was hurried from the diving platform on the rear of the Polaris to the compression chamber, where he was subjected to an air pressure equivalent to that which they have been working under. The chamber, he reported, is gradually brought to normal before the diver is allowed to enter the open air.

After another hour Ingraham took his place near the diving boat which was lowered by crane into the water. He had drained the stray rudder and sank and was working on the local planes and padding, being carefully adjusted by diving supervisors, including Lt. William Longman and O. H. Zibbell.

# BELIEVES ENOUGH POWER WOULD BE SOLD TO SOON RECOVER BID

### California Engineer After Study of Lowline Drop Reports Findings; Offers Suggestions Relative to Proposed Power Project.

"Upon this basis, the power sold would approximately equal the amount of depreciation. If the operation be included, about \$1,000,000 worth of power would be sold, about the amount reported by the California Engineer, consulting electrical engineer, who has been studying the power situation at the lowline drop at the Twin Falls Canal company. The report, prepared especially for the California Engineer, was submitted to the company yesterday.

"If the above items be sold, the total amount of power would be sold for the two-year period to recover the \$1,000,000 offered in the bid. The balance of the bid for the water and power is about \$1,000,000. It says concerning the bid of \$100,000 made by the Marquette Irrigation district for a lease of the site as a part of the program of reclamation of approximately 50,000 acres in the Basin Irrigation in Twin Falls and Coconino counties.

"The proposition of the Irrigation district and the report of the engineer will be considered in a public hearing by the California Engineer, which will be held in the city of Twin Falls, Idaho, on December 30, when this question will be one of the issues.

"In making his report, the engineer has included considerable data regarding the drop and the methods used to determine the value.

The reports:

**Sloutchik Report.**

"The Twin Falls Canal company conveys water for irrigation purposes from an intake at Millers dam through its main canal on the south side of the Snake river to a point about one-half mile south of the city of Twin Falls, at which point a canal divides and conveys the water to several small districts through what is locally known as the lowline canal.

"At the point of diversion the topography of the country is such that it is possible to take advantage of a drop of approximately 100 feet for power purposes, passing the water through turbines and turbines in the lowline canal to its primary purpose of irrigation.

**Irish Situation.**

"This there is brought about a rather unique situation. In the usual hydro-electric plant development, the water is conveyed in a pipe through an elaborate dam in the river, provides reservoir capacity, together with a dam and conduit to convey the water to the power site, but in this particular instance these construction costs are unnecessary. The water is conveyed through the irrigation canal and the power site is in the lowline canal at the foot of diversion dam, storage capacity and can be conveyed leading to the power site, and as much as the power itself, therefore in this instance a large part of the investment is saved.

"The canal conveying the water has been in use many years. Its banks are well seasoned, the stream flows can be accurately regulated and the water and power site represent a dependable single source of power and is a valuable asset to the canal company.

**Reliable Source of Power.**

"This value is further enhanced by the fact that the point of installation of the power, namely, the pumping plant at Millers dam in the city of Twin Falls, is of approximately 25 miles. Aside from such occasional outages as would occur in any similar plant, this situation represents a reliable source of power. Other things being equal, the nearer the water right and power site is to the point of consumption the more valuable is the water right. The method of valuing a water right for power purposes is complex, owing to the factors involved. If the market value of a water right were ascertainable with the same degree of accuracy as the value of a bond, the determination of the water right would be simple.

"However, the provision is always attached in an indirect way and the courts and commissions receive evidence along lines not set out in this report to arrive at conclusions in fixing the value of water rights for power purposes.

"It is common to place a toll or carrying charge upon the allowable hour output of the plant, this securing compensation for the water right, the canal and the site, and this method is not out in this report.

"It is common to compare the cost of power output at the site under consideration with the cost of power or electricity power elsewhere, thus setting up a relative value and this method is used in this report.
