### Californians Seek Dinosaur's Graves

LOS ANGELES—In the rugged mountains, where winds race over peaks of bluish and animal life prevail, men are working out the hanging course of the dinosaur.

The devil lizard of Komodo Island, the reptile which attacks the human intruder of the forest also will attack the 35 men of the Galapagos expedition who are on their way out from Los Angeles harbor on a five-months' cruise Jan. 15.

In the party will be Dr. George Mikko Sutton, famous bird curator and one of the foremost bird painters of the United States, it was announced. Donald Ford of the Michigan Museum of Zoology is to gather specimens for the institution.

Enter the director of F. H. Herck and George Knox, business manager, respectively, will be on the yacht Sultana, to be skippered by Capt. J. Carpolin.

The itinerary of the expedition includes Panama, the Coral Island, Galapagos Islands, Samoa, Fiji, Australia, Komoro, and the Malay, Java, Siam, Singapore, Harbin, Dutch, Guine, Madagascar Islands and the Galapagos group, it followed by the leaders in the realization of the dinosaur grave yard.

The Galapagos group is said to have been touched by several of the greatest expeditions. Herck hopes to hack its way much deeper into the forbidding undergrowth than the preceding ones.

An amphibian airplane, to be carried aboard the Sultana, would be used in the event of a breakdown of the ship, which would be used to land.

The enormous devil lizard lives on land and water. The reptile, it is said, will attack man and has been known to swim 200 to 300 yards off-shore to fight young sharks.

A small specimen brought out by a previous expedition died within a short time. Every facility will be provided aboard the Sultana for studying the rare animals and delicate plants.

Specimens of the Martin Island lizard and the devil fish also will be brought back alive if possible.

Complete apparatus for motion pictures, together with a leading man and a leading woman, will be used in the production of a feature film by a pilot by Paul Perry, chief photographer and a member of the American Society of Cinematographers.

### McNary-Haugen Bill Will Be Passed Again

Efforts to reach a compromise agreement on farm relief proves futile.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23.—Efforts to reach a compromise agreement on farm relief have given little and it now appears likely that congress will pass the old McNary-Haugen bill with some changes, although that seems to be contrary to the view of President Coolidge.

Some congressmen and three weeks ago some farm bill leaders have been working steadily to bring about passage of the McNary-Haugen amendment to the farm bill.

Now these efforts will be dropped and the agricultural committee of both houses will be called to meet on the 24th Christmas holidays to whip the McNary bill in shape for presentation.

Just who is responsible for the failure of the compromise efforts has not been determined to anyone's satisfaction.

The Tribune Press is informed that Chairman McNary of senate agricultural committee submitted to President Coolidge before congress met a bill which would have established a direct government farm system to enable cooperative marketing organizations to handle surplus for export.

Mr. Coolidge submitted the measure to Secretary of Agriculture Darridge and to Secretary of Commerce Hoover, who were doubtful about one of its features. Meanwhile, the farm bill itself found numerous objections to the McNary plan, and many of its important provisions were dropped or altered to stand by the bill until a better bill was found.

That farm compromise efforts at an impasse which now has reached the point where these concerns believe further steps along those lines would be fruitless.

Now the old bill will be whipped into shape for the first part of January and presented without major changes for a vote expected in the senate by Feb. 1. The house agriculture committee will begin hearings on it on Jan. 16 and action there may be delayed until the senate has taken the first step.

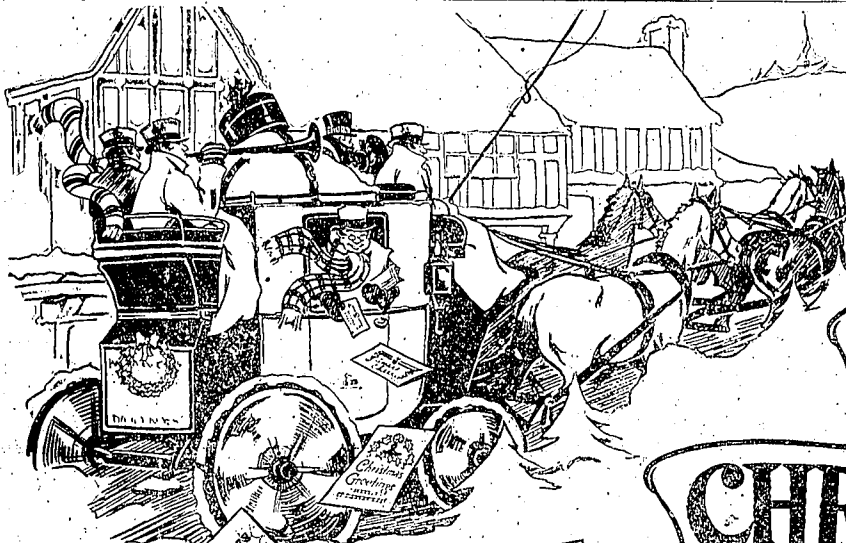

## Blasts Theory About Telling Snake's Age

HARRISBURG, Pa.—The old theory that the age of a rattlesnake can be accurately told by the number of rings on its rattle is incorrect, according to Howard P. Sloss, first ranger in the State's state forest. Sloss has made a study of the dangerous reptile.

In blasting the theory of the snake's age he declares that instead of gaining one ring each year the rattlesnake gains from one to four. "The forest ranger declares that a snake seldom has more than ten rings on its rattle because after they attain that length the vibration is such that they drop off and are lost."

The idea that a rattlesnake cannot give its warning after autumn or crawling through wet grass is incorrectly stated.

"Investigation has shown" he said, "that a young rattlesnake is provided with a single button at birth. Within a few days it sheds its skin and continues to shed in two months of which its skin for the second time and then the first ring of the rattle is uncovered or added. This has been growing under the old skin as its presence was apparent in the swollen appearance of the tail at the base of the original button. The last new or eight vertebrae fuse together shortly after birth and form a compound bone known as the stinger and it is around this bone that each cap or ring of the rattle forms."

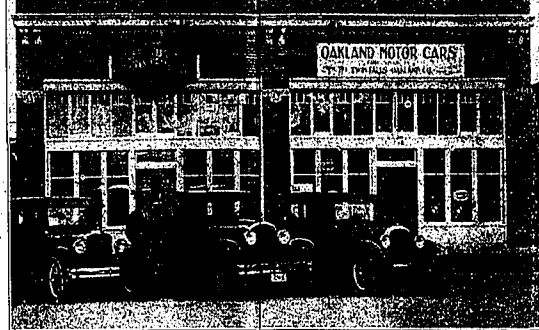
Sloss said that hill snakes have the habit of shedding their skins one or more times each year. (Continued from Page 1) will arrive at 4 p. m. Then Hickman probably will be given a more severe examination than he has undergone to date. He has had things his own way generally. He has admitted acts and denied others but so far no one has bothered him in challenging his statement that "Andrew Craner" actually killed the Parker girl.

BOARD PORTLAND, LIMITED, arrived at PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 23.—Grim and determined, six officers of Los Angeles were hearing Pendleton this afternoon with only one thought, that William Edward Hickman must hang for the brutal slaying of Marion Parker.

"I could convict him tomorrow on the evidence I have now," Asa Keyer noted district attorney of Los Angeles county, told the United Press in an exclusive interview.

"But we are going to get his full story when we arrive in Pendleton this afternoon to be sure of our case," the prosecutor added.

Expected to Get Confession.—Keyer said he felt certain the man's alibi would be able to wear a confidence of the actual slaying from young Hickman, the 14 year old "fox" who brought more worries to these six seaman officers than any other case they have ever been connected with, they admitted.

"A terrific lead was lifted from my shoulders when I heard that Hickman had been captured and arrested in Portland," James Davis, police chief of Los Angeles, told the correspondent as we sat alone in a drawing room.

"Have you seen the pictures?" Davis asked the writer. And he drew from an envelope the gruesome photo of Marion's torso as she was returned to her father, Perry Parker, Los Angeles banker. The man had been cut off at the elbows and the picture revealed her body had been cut in two just above her hips. Even, the stitches of black thread that had held the eyes of the little girl open were noticeable in the prints.

PENDLETON, Ore., Dec. 23.—Mixed feelings today greeted the statement of Edward Hickman, accused kidnaper and murderer, in which he characterized kidnaping and murders as the worst of crimes.

A few believe he made the plea in earnest, but many think he is still playing the part of "the fox." The statement created a sensation here although few believe him truly repentant.

The statement, addressed to the boys and girls of America follows: "This affair has gained nationwide publicity and the great reward and praise by the people of the west coast show the opposition of the American people to criminal tendencies.

"Kidnaping and savage murders are the worst of America's crimes, and everything should be done to prevent anyone from interfering in any way with the liberty and life of an American citizen.

"The young men and college students of America should consider this Parker case as a typical crime of the worst that can happen when a young man gradually loses interest in his

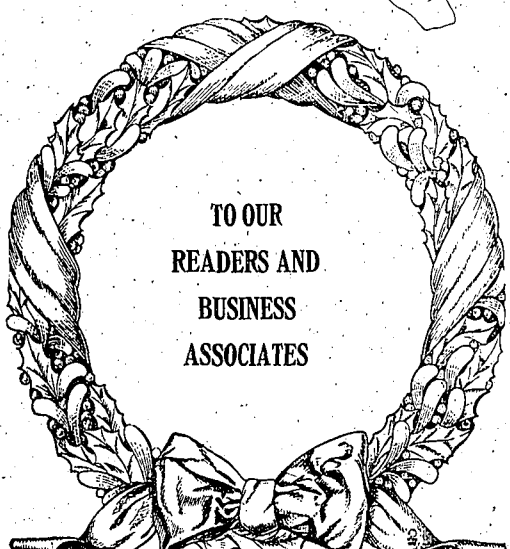

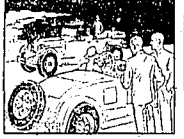

## USES OF AGRICULTURAL PRODUCTS TO BE ENCOURAGED RECOMMENDED

That farm products feed the stomach is a commonly accepted notion. That they may also feed the factory is not so generally known. And yet the need of industry for agricultural products is a possible way to find relief from the much discussed ills of the American farmer. One of the recommendations for improvement recently made to President Coolidge by the American Society of Agricultural Engineers was that encouragement be given to the further development of industrial uses of all farm products.

By diverting a sufficient portion of farm production from food uses into raw materials for industry it is held, the excess production of food crops may be affecting adversely the farmer's prices may be materially reduced. Also, industrial uses may be discovered for the 600,000,000 tons of straw, corn cobs and other inedible wastes that are by-products of farming operations.

Industry itself, in the search for raw materials, has concentrated to progress along this line. One large company manufacturing rayon, occupying former distilleries in Terre Haute and Peoria, is using more corn for making butyl alcohol, acetone and other solvents than formerly passed through the same buildings, and has made into potable alcohol. The company is consuming around 25,000 bushels of corn daily.


Strengthening Effect on Prices. The corn products industry, manufacturing starch, dextrin, corn syrup and corn oil, may contribute something over 16 per cent of the cash corn that reaches the numerous markets. The annual crop is, in round numbers, three billion bushels of corn daily.

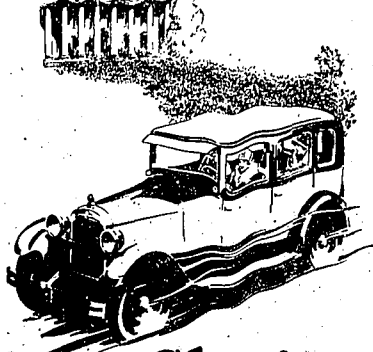

PARIS—Reckless as they are, the chauffeurs of Paris are no less dangerous to persons than their comrade of London, who are reputed to be the safest and most careful drivers in the world. For the year 1926 street accidents caused by automobiles in France resulted in 2,150 deaths, while the figures for England for the same period were 421,000 automobiles in the French streets, while in England there were only 1,000,000.

Asks World Law To Guard Workers

By United Press. GENEVA—Industrial accidents are increasing so rapidly throughout the world that the International Labor Bureau here has decided to demand international action for their prevention.

The question has been placed on the agenda of the next international labor conference that will be held here in May, 1928. An effort will be made to launch an international convention regarding all matters that touch common action for safeguarding the lives of workmen.

According to statistics secured by the labor bureau, 25,000 workmen were killed last year in labor accidents in the United States alone. The cost of these accidents is placed at \$100,000,000 a year.

In France the labor accidents last year cost \$100,000,000. In the other hand it has been demonstrated that by the application of certain measures of protection in certain industries the number of accidents have been reduced 60, 70 and even 80 per cent.

Among the provisions that are planned for the international convention on the subject is one requiring all employers to submit plans of their establishments to government inspection before beginning their operations. Provisions will also be made for close collaboration between government authorities, employers, workmen and insurance companies and for "safety first" campaigns and education.

Special attention will be given to cases of workmen where accidents are especially numerous, namely, railway trackmen and workers engaged in loading and unloading ships.
