

Californians Seek Dinosaurs' Graves

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 23.—A California island, where weird, rare specimens of plant and animal life prevail, has to seek out the hunting ground of that era.

The devil lizard of Komodo Island, the repellent sea snake and the interesting remains of the crocodile also will attract the collector. A California exploration expedition who will sail from Los Angeles harbor on a nine-months' cruise Jan. 15.

The leader of the party will be Dr. George Mikado Sutton, famous bird authority and one of the foremost bird guides of the United States. It was announced yesterday at the California Museum of Zoology at Berkeley that Sutton is to gather specimens for that institution.

Under the direction of E. H. Hartman, director of the California Museum, the expedition will sail in the yacht "Sultana," to be skippered by Capt. J. Carpenter.

The party of the expedition includes Panama, the Corcovado Island, Galapagos Islands, Samoa, Fiji, Australia, Komodo and Bull Islands, Java, Sumatra, Malaya, the Philippines, the South Marshall Islands and Hawaii.

Indefatigable island of the Galapagos group, is believed by the leaders to be the home of the last surviving mammoth graveyard.

The Galapagos also is said to have been touched by several parties, but the present expedition will be the first to make its way into the forbidding underworld of its predecessors.





COUNTY COMMISSIONER DISCUSSES WELFARE WORK NECESSARY HERE

**Short Harvest Season Produces Economic Condition Call-
ing for Solution Outside the Province of a
County, Says J. L. Barnes.**

"That there should be so much hardship and destruction in so prosperous a community is surely an anomalous condition," said County Commissioner J. L. Barnes in discussing the manner in which the county handles such a general problem.

"During the past year of 1926 there was an expenditure of \$25,000 to round numbers for what might be termed welfare work. This amount is the support of the county's widows, the care of the aged, the care of the orphans, relief of their families' widows' pensions, supplies for the poor, medical attendances and some care of tramps. There were no appearances in touch with their families and friends. There can be no question of the need, but the remedy after all must be left to the state. There is no question of the amount of money that, had it been available, would have been available, especially that of clothing donations."

"Such transient labor is attracted to the city by the high wages paid during the peak of the harvest season; that when that comparatively short period ends, there is nowhere else to go. The same is true of another transient, who comes to town, another transient, who calls to someone else where the pastures look greener. There is no economic condition that calls for a solution obviously outside the province of any one county, but in the administration of the necessary relief work in the country there is no question of the fact that it could be better done with greater economy. If all the interested bodies united under one head, a welfare board, the cost would be cut down and the city of Boise included."

"The recent law that gives us the right to employ prisoners on public works is a good one, but we are overwhelmed, but we are met with lack of work to do. Under our present highway system, centralized, there are many roads in the unpaved. Employment of prisoners by highways and municipalities is optional with officials and are slow to take up the plan of labor camps."

"An entirely separate problem is presented by the families of men who are held in jail for law infractions. They cannot make any kind of provision and when the犯人 pay rent, water, lights, food and clothing for several months following their release, they are unable to find a home. Asks World Law To Guard Workers

By United Press

GENEVA—Industrial accidents are increasing so rapidly throughout the world that the international labor secretariat here has decided to demand international action for their prevention.

The question has been placed on the agenda of the next International Conference of Labor, which will meet here in May, 1928. An effort will be made to launch an international convention requiring all nations to take steps to make more secure the lives of workers.

According to statistics secured by the labor bureau, 25,000 workers were killed last year in labor accidents in the United States. The cost of these accidents is placed at \$1,000,000 a year.

In France the labor secretariat lists 10,000 deaths.

On the other hand it has been demonstrated that by the application of certain measures of protection in industry the number of fatalities can be reduced by 80 per cent.

Among the provisions that are planned for the international convention are those requiring all employers to submit the plan of their establishments to government inspection before they are put into operation. Provisions will also be made for close collaboration between government authorities, employers and workers in insurance companies and for safety first campaigns and education.

Special attention will be given to areas of backwardness where accidents are especially numerous, namely railroad brakemen and employees in mining and auto racing.






