A NIAGARAGUAN SPEAKS. If there is anyone who should be able to speak with authority and understanding as to the service which has been rendered by the United States armies in Niagara and the desirability of those soldiers remaining there, it is Gen. J. M. Moncada. He was in command of the liberal army, which was seeking to overthrow the Billa government at the time Henry J. Simmons, the student representative of the president of the United States, went there to investigate.

The Niagara was captured, towns on the Atlantic coast and was apparently leading his army to victory. But upon the promise of Simmons that the elections next year would be supervised by the United States marines, he laid down his arms and surrendered his advantage. He has been in the United States for some time and has written an article in a current publication, in which he insists that it is the duty of this government to live up to its promise and see to it that the elections next year are fair, free and open.

Speaking further, he says: "I am perfectly convinced, however, that Senators or any other statesmen will always need the help of the United States to establish a good government. When General Stimson told me at Tipitapa that the president of the United States was willing to assist in the supervision of our election in 1928, I felt and still feel that this would open to Niagara the only way by which such good government and lasting peace could be established."

It is asserted by General Moncada that his country stands in need of republican education and that this can be achieved in a period of 12 years or more under the supervision of the United States government. The passing of every four-year period will see this education completed for the national guard which will be trained and organized under the supervision of American officers. He respects the law and judicial institutions, while the congress will be composed of better men, because they are freely elected by the people.

"The watchful eye of the United States," declares General Moncada, "can be no better opened than in this noble cause. The very Monroe doctrine compels the United States to that direction for that doctrine justifies for the New World the fullest realization of republicanism and democracy."

GIVE REPORT ON BOND REFUNDING

Number of Items of Business Taken Up at Regular Council Meeting.

Final report on the matter of the refunding bonds for the Twin Falls city waterworks was made at the regular meeting of the city council last evening at the city hall. Under the present arrangement the total issue will be retired at the end of 10 years with the interest charges materially reduced. In case the commission determines to pay the indebtedness through an increased water consumption rate instead of through a general tax levy, as is now being done, a revision upward in the present rates of at least 50 per cent will be required. The last state legislature gave to the city the option of so paying the cost of waterworks improvements. During the administration of E. H. Hodge as mayor, the commissioners desired to pay off the indebtedness of the waterworks department through its earnings but the court ruled that such action was contrary to the law. The last legislature revised the law, making such procedure possible.

BOY ORDERED TO MOTHER'S CARE

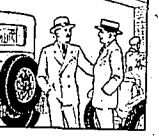

FOOTBALL OFFICIALS GATHER AT NEW YORK FOR ANNUAL SESSION

Number of Leading 'Men in White Knickers' Express Opinion That Game is Becoming Too Complicated; Rule Changes Bring Trouble.

By FRANK BETTY.

Leading three sports editors, New York, Dec. 25.—A group of officials who suffered for many months during the 1927 season, gathered today at the Hotel Astor to make up their own beliefs.

There was a time when the men in white knickers who officiated at the leading spring games were paid scant attention by the partisans thronged to witness the respective sides of the chalk lined players.

This year, however, changes in the playing rules brought about an unprecedented number of protests, which the rulings of the officials had a most important bearing upon the result of the game.

There was the case of the Notre Dame-Southern California intercollegiate game, for instance, in which the decision of the umpire regarding a fumble behind the trials was the deciding contest in favor of the Southern team and led to protests from the Trojans which have not yet died away.

Members of the Football Officials' association, who opened their annual session here today blamed the complications of the new rules for their difficulties.

Football, from a game once decided obviously upon the merits of the respective contestants has come to be a game where a delicate decision may be left up to some peripheral official. Take the difference between a fumble and a punt, and the 1927 rules. A punt is a quarterback receiving a ball, occurs when the receiver or a naturally obtains possession of the ball. A fumble occurs when he first possesses and then drops it.

Obviously this requires, on occasions, hairline decisions by the official responsible, and whatever is decided, players, spectators and occasionally other officials are dissatisfied. The question of the rules is being raised in the coming season, and it is expected that the officials will also be troubled many of the football officials who gathered at the Hotel Astor today.

Don Thorpe, Walter Eckersall, Dave Schultz and other well known officials, whose services are in demand for the leading games were unanimous in expressing the opinion that the game had become too complicated.

Smith Introduces Commodities Bill

A bill entitled "Perishable Agricultural Commodities Act of 1927" has been introduced in the house of representatives by Congressman Addison T. Smith, as H. R. 7276, according to word received here.

The bill prohibits fraudulent practices and charges on the part of commission agents, forbids them to reject or discard or destroy perishable commodities, to make misleading statements or engage in unfair practices. Commission merchants must obtain licenses from the secretary of agriculture and must provide bond and other such terms and in each amount the secretary shall prescribe. Provision is made for enforcing the authority of the department head at every instance, and he is given authority to call upon the attorney general to conduct any case arising under the law through legal channels.

The bill was introduced Dec. 14 and referred to the committee on International and foreign commerce.
