GOVERNMENT TAKES HAND IN ACTIVITIES OF MEXICAN REBELS

Guerrilla Warfare Reported; Bombing of Trains Causes Dispatch of Armed Forces in Hope of Blotting Out Desperado Bands

MEXICO CITY, Feb. 8.—The government today apparently was concentrating all its available troops in the states of Jalisco and Guanajuato, where disturbing reports were made of rebel activities, including firing and bombing of trains.

War Minister Joaquin Amaro personally is directing the forces in the region of Los Altos, state of Guanajuato, where many rebels were reported to have fled from the state of Jalisco.

The government's efforts seem to be directed toward eliminating each center of rebels and ending all train holdups.

Dispatches from Guadalajara hint of a new rebel activity including one in the region of Tlaxcala where 14 rebels were killed and five captured and executed.

The rebel dispatch from Guadalajara first of a train from Manzanillo being fired upon and bombed. Five passengers were wounded.

The rebels continued their attack on the train until dispersed by federal troops at the station of San Mateo.

The government's intention here is to bring the threat of the rebel fight to the attention of the rebels and to present a quick and complete defeat of the revolutionaries.

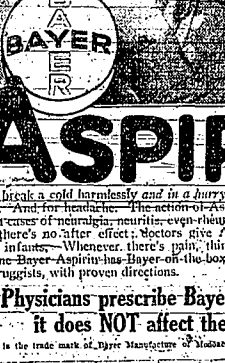

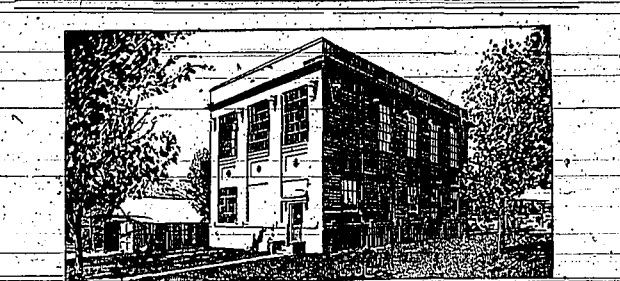

DAIRY INDUSTRY SHOWS MARKED GROWTH IN TWIN FALLS REGION

Growth is Reflected in Organization of Dairy Farmers

Growth of the dairy industry in the Twin Falls region is reflected in the formation of several new organizations of dairy farmers in the region.

The Twin Falls Milk Producers' Association, which held their annual meeting at the grand building at Piler yesterday, there are four districts which are united in the association with the parent organization at Jerome, known as the Jerome Cooperative Dairy Association. There are called Twin Falls, County Dairy men's association, Eden-Highgate association, Wendover association, and Mint-Caseta association. The main plant for these four associations is located at Jerome, Idaho. A similar centralized organization in operation at Coeur d'Alene during the second district and the third is at Piler with a branch of the plant at Wendover. The union of these three districts is called the Coeur d'Alene Cooperative Dairy Association, and all of their products are marketed through the Coeur d'Alene Dairymen's Association of Los Angeles, an excellent co-operative in its plan. The range of its selling operations and the quality of the butter is indicated in the sales record of 55 per cent of all the butter met in the Los Angeles district.

The Piler meeting was attended by about 150 persons who spent the morning in a round table discussion of dairymen's problems. At noon there was a luncheon, followed by the election of a director to represent the Twin Falls branch on the board of the Jerome district. Dan Koenig, vice president of the Wendover branch, who has held this position for the past two years, was re-elected. Koenig is also the representative of the Jerome board in the International Dairy Union. That the Twin Falls district has increased its production by the report of Roy B. Smith, superintendent of the Jerome factory, in the delivery of the plant of 68,000 pounds of butter for which the producers received \$200,000.75, an increase of over 20 per cent in the quality of the cream was indicated since the first of the production in 1926.

Loyalty of the local people to the local milk producer is shown in the consumption of 148,810 pounds of butter, 30,000 of this being sold over the country of the local district. The remainder was used by the members of the association, taken in exchange for their products.

Whole milk is used at the canning plants and Geo. H. Davis of the Butte branch, showed that this led to a loss in the delivery an average return of about \$500 a day.


