Mr. Hines will teach school administration, principles of elementary education and educational measurement. Joseph Wesley Hinton, University of Idaho, will teach general psychology, psychology of advertising and psychology of school subjects. Louis Schmitz, University of Idaho, will teach modern history and English literature. Dr. H. H. Haulton, University of Idaho, will teach Principles of Economics, besides supervising the luncheon course. A bulletin on the summer school is now in the process of formulation.
