PROPOSED EXPENSES FOR THIS YEAR ABOUT \$4000 GREATER THAN IN '27

Twin Falls county commissioners are today giving the first consideration to the estimated budget of \$220,770.05 for the fiscal year beginning April 1, 1928, which shows an excess of \$26,466.05 over the estimated revenue of \$194,304.00.

Proposed increases in the salaries of deputies were featured in each estimate while new cars and large increases in the estimated cost of upkeep for automobiles were also a feature.

DEPENDENT MAN COMMITTS SUICIDE

Bernhart, Peterson, Takes Own Life; Was Losing Eyesight.

Dependent because of failing eyesight, Bernhart Peterson, aged about 65 years, committed suicide yesterday at the "Wagon" when Henry Harris, son of Mrs. Ollie Harris, proprietress of the hotel, at about 7:30 p. m. yesterday, discovered a man dead in his room with a mirror held through his head and a 32-caliber automatic pistol clutched in his left hand. A note left by Peterson stated that he had shot himself.

The death note, the contents of which were found lying on the right side of a heavy coat in a pool of blood, the foot of the bed, and still crooked about the trigger of a 32-caliber Colt automatic, and the fact that the note which had been written had been lying on the dresser in his room for the last several days all indicated that the death was suicide.
