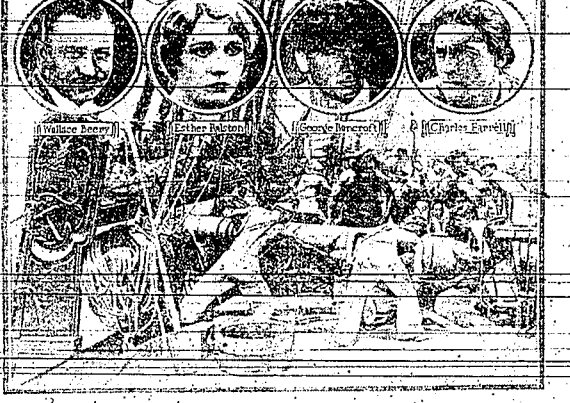

ANOTHER TIME OF TESTING COMES TO REAL MEN

Collapsing of what was known as the St. Francis dam during the early hours of Tuesday, let loose a flood of water that swept down the Santa Clara valley to the sea, leaving in its wake a sorry tale of destruction of human life and of property and entailing untold misery and suffering.

The St. Francis dam, completed about one year ago, was part of the Los Angeles waterworks system. Apparently a cloud burst in the high Sierra mountains brought about such a flood of water that the works of man failed to meet the emergency.

It may be days before the exact extent of the disaster will become known but rescue and relief agencies are already at work, notably the American Red Cross, rendering what service is possible.

Swooping down as out of a clear sky, such reverses as this serve to try men's souls. But time sets things straight. Californians are not easily discouraged. Of course the loss of life, whatever it may have been is something that cannot be mended and to those bereaved the world will extend sympathy born of human experience.

Property losses are not of consequence as compared with a death toll yet even under these circumstances men and women will set to work to overcome such handicaps as may have arisen. That is the spirit of Californians—that is the spirit of Americans.
