NO ROOM IN THIS COUNTRY FOR THE IDLE.

The loafer is without standing in this country—an out-cast.

And that applies equally to the rich and the poor. The Good-Lord never intended that men and women should be idle for the simple reason that there is too much to do in this old world to keep things running and insure life and protection for the masses, to permit of standing still as a regular diet.

During the course of the present Senate investigation at Washington into the unemployment situation, Senator Wagner of New-York made a statement which caused the said senators to sit up and take notice. He said this:

"We may as well determine right here that we are not going to wage relentless war until we abolish involuntary idleness as surely as we abolish involuntary servitude."

The Senate evidently is convinced that there is no room in the United States for the fellow who is too lazy to work. Just how the State proposes to give every individual a job is a program yet to be worked out by statesmen, business heads and economists but we have in mind the need for additional thousands of miles of national highways, the deepening of harbors and navigable rivers as an aid to navigation and commerce and development of natural resources as a part of the federal public works department. There is plenty of work to do if ways and means can be found to utilize idle man power. After that, the idler could readily be spotted and dealt with.

Somewhat has figured out that if a man weighs 140 pounds, his weight in gold would be roughly \$40,000 and at 6 per cent, \$2,000 a year. On this basis of computation, there are plenty of individuals worth their weight in gold.

However, there is another side to the picture. The same authority insists that the junk value of a human being is worth somewhere around 87-cents so here we have a picture painted in brilliant colors of the man of reasonable earning power being worth his weight in gold while the idler and the bum is scarcely worth more than a shovel-ful of fertilizer and is not worth the room he occupies.

There certainly ought to be enough cooperation between the people and the government to solve the riddle of unemployment for the lasting benefit of the individuals themselves and of the nation as a whole.

THE SWORD OF ISLAM AGAIN A MENACE

Recent press dispatches give prominence to a new threat of war on a comparatively small scale at the beginning yet fraught with grave consequences if allowed to get well under way. The scene of the trouble is the little-known kingdom of Arabia and the opposing forces in this threatened conflict are the Arabian tribesmen and the armed forces of Great Britain.

On the face of things we are told that this is a holy war caused by the failure of the King of Hedjaz to impress the "infidels" owing allegiance to the British empire to adopt the religion of Islam. Therefore, true to the teachings of Allah, the sword is the only cogent measure to be employed in bringing these recalcitrants to time. And the Arabs know how to use the sword effectively.

They possess fighting blood and death for them on fields of battle means naught but the highest glory for it involves transition to the highest heaven wherein Allah dwells so that any sacrifice is worth the making with a reward such as that assured.

But this is not all. We are told that there is oil in Arabia and that many nations are eager to obtain concessions, Great Britain most of all because these oil wells are not so far from the Suez canal, the control of which water-way is vital to Great Britain as the short route to India and the Far East. Therefore, Great Britain cannot afford to leave the Suez canal unprotected for it might not take the Arabs long to blow up the engineering works on which the British have spent millions.

So we see once more that commercialism is at the bottom of almost all international misunderstandings. In this instance it is difficult to understand all the ramifications of the dispute but it is to be hoped that wise heads will take hold of the situation, pacify the Arabian tribesmen and prevent a holy war brought about to cloak the real motives sure to be kept in the background.

EXPERT DIVER STOPPING LEAK AT MAGIC DAM

Reservoir Holds Greatest Amount of Water Ever Stored at This Time: Pressure of Ice Field Blamed for Recent Break.

According to George N. Carter of Boise, state commissioner of reclamation, the heavy snow which accumulated in Twin Falls late last night from the Magic dam, 20 miles north of Shoshone, has caused the water to be gradually being stopped, and to the work of an expert diver brought to the scene by the Wood Canal company.

It appears that an unusual and unprecedented condition brought about the damage to the dam. Concrete towers at the present time there is an estimated volume in the Magic dam more than 100,000,000 gallons of water, the greatest amount ever known at this time of year and the largest quantity ever to be frozen ever solidly. The theory of the expert engineers who have visited the dam since the break in the tower developed, is that enormous pressure of the ice field, formed along the extensive slope, forced the tower on its perpendicular center a crack in the base through which an estimated flow of 375,000 gallons of water ran out under the dam from the big Wood river through the underground tunnel. The tower, located about the center of the dam, stands about 100 feet high and is about 65 feet in diameter, including the concrete base. The crack developed at a depth of about 50 feet, flooding the central reservoir and breaking the chains which are used to open and close the sluice gates. The problem is to reach the tower to prevent further ingress of water from the reservoir. The lighting of the structure has been a great help in the effort to reach the tower, which means that has been given the tower by the reclamation company.

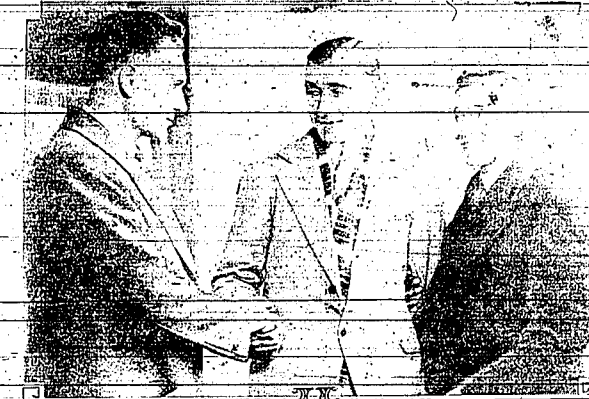

Flood Control Of Mississippi Now A National Issue

National Legislative Committee of American League Goes on Record

WASHINGTON, March 15.—The vital flood control legislation has been introduced in Congress by the favorable committee vote on the Reed Flood Control Bill, according to the report February 18 of the National Legislative Committee of the American League.

The House flood control committee believes, long before the report was made, that the problem of controlling the Mississippi river is a national one, and should be met by the nation at large.

The administration had recommended that 20 per cent of the cost should be met by the communities in which the construction work will be done.

The flooded areas are not in themselves responsible for the huge volume of water—the drainage of the entire basin, the Rocky and the Alleghany Mountains—but they are the victims of it.

The plan is to have the federal government contribute to the cost of the permanent solution of the problem, which has been recognized as one of greater importance than the Panama canal.
