Without waiting for the final responsibility of the city of Los Angeles for the collapse of the St. Francis dam, the city council has authorized the board of public works to advance \$1,000,000 to aid in rehabilitation work.

The other half of the million dollars fund will be spent until the completion of the reconstruction of the dam. Preparations were being made in Santa Paula today for the burial of the victims of the disaster. The city was draped in mourning and practically all business was suspended. The official death toll was approximately 570, with 177 others listed as missing and believed dead.

A group of engineering experts appointed by the city council to investigate the cause of the dam-collapse was drawing up its report today.

A committee of engineers appointed by Governor Ladd to conduct an investigation on behalf of the state of California, was to begin its work this week.







A DECISION-MAKING FOR CONTINUED FRIENDSHIP

For half a century or more, prior of last December, there was in effect along the border between the United States and Canada a sort of understanding that mutual "commuting" between the two countries was quite in order, a situation that enabled Canadians to flock into the United States in pursuit of business and Americans to "invade" Canada at will for the same purpose and without any formalities as regards immigration laws and regulations. Then Uncle Sam clamped down the lid; the bars were put up by the United States government against Canadians entering this country without payment of the head tax of \$8 each and compliance with the other regulations of the immigration department.

There might have been a time when serious ill-feeling over such a situation might have been engendered between the two countries but cool heads proceeded to make a friendly test case and now the United States Circuit Court of Appeals has handed down a unanimous decision that the Jay treaty, entered into by Canada and the United States back in 1794, still holds in this instance and that workers of either nationality have the right to transact business in the neighboring country and for that purpose to enter their respective countries temporarily, without the usual immigration restrictions.

Strictly speaking, the spirit of the labor unions of the country which were behind the movement to shut out Canadian labor from the United States was based on a degree of right, the contention being that people who earn their bread and butter in this country ought to become residents and naturalized citizens. On the other hand, there is a factor of good will between the two countries that perhaps outweighs the mere matter of dollars and cents but these considerations, after all, do not seem to enter in the matter since the courts hold that the Jay agreement makes this long-established custom permissible and legal.

From a business and trade standpoint the Dominion of Canada is our best customer—but we reciprocate by invading the Canadian provinces every summer from Vancouver to Portland, leaving millions of dollars in hard cash in the hands of the friendly "enemy" in settlement of gasoline, oil, tires, "refreshments," hotel bills and other incidentals.

WHAT WE SPEND FOR PREPARED MEALS

Striking illustrations of the differing characteristics of American cities are afforded by an analysis of the results of the recently completed census of distribution compiled by the department of domestic distribution of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. In Baltimore only 11.11 per cent of the money expended for food goes for prepared meals, in Providence 12.07 per cent and in Atlanta 12.66. In Kansas City the proportion jumps to 22.88 per cent, in Denver to 29.36, in Seattle to 29 and in San Francisco, which stands at the top of the list in this respect, to 28.49. In other words, the farther west one goes the more money is spent in cafes and restaurants and the less in grocery stores. Baltimore spends 43.81 cents of its food dollar for groceries, Providence 46.27 cents and Atlanta 47.21. But west of the Mississippi, Kansas City spends only 32.72, Denver 35.20, Seattle 32.57 and San Francisco 28.85.




