RAILROADS SEEK AUTHORITY TO JOIN

WOULD ALSO TAKE OVER BRANCH LINES

Idaho Road Among Those Mentioned

Expect Deal of Great Magnitude to Be Put Through Soon

WASHINGTON, March 29—The Great Northern and Northern Pacific railroads, which are seeking federal authority to unify their systems, today presented to the interstate commerce commission a proposal for purchasing the 427-mile line of the Minneapolis and St. Louis railroad by the proposed Great Northern-Northern Pacific company.

The two roads, which would be combined into the Great Northern-Northern Pacific system, would be in the hands of the U. S. P. to take over six short line railroads in Minnesota, Montana, Idaho and Wyoming and continue operation of all but one.

The proposal was in disapproval of the commission's recommendation that the railroad be sold to the state of Idaho and operated as a public utility.

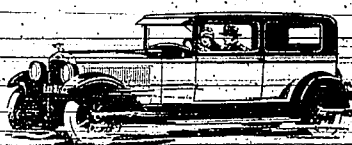

REQUIRING A KNOWLEDGE OF THE PRINCIPLES OF GOVERNMENT

Editorial comment is being made on the plans for the opening of a School of Government with the beginning of the term at George Washington University in the city of Washington. This new chair is being made possible by a donation of a million dollars from the Supreme Court of Southern Jurisdiction of Scottish Rite Masons Memorial to George Washington.

As said requirements for admission will be graduation from an accredited high school with the required number of units. The course, which will take four years to complete, will be wide in scope, the idea being to give the student a better idea about government administration, federal, state or local, and inculcate in them a clear conception of the duties and obligations of citizenship. The classes in local administration will make use of the different types of city administration and the material presented in public health and social science, political science, economics, commerce, political science, institutional law will be stressed; in foreign service, language, export and import trade, international and international finance.

Foreign Service Course, the purpose of which is to prepare students a preparation that will enable them to meet advantageously the severe competition in foreign and export businesses of the United States, and give them a better opportunity of securing positions in the Diplomatic and Consular Service in the Department of State and Foreign Trade Service of the Department of Commerce, and the other departments, will be made four years' work.
 There is a real need for competent young men and women in the theory and science of government that can deal intelligently with the many problems that arise in this progressive age. 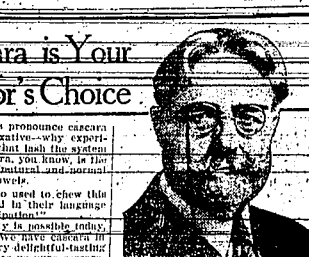

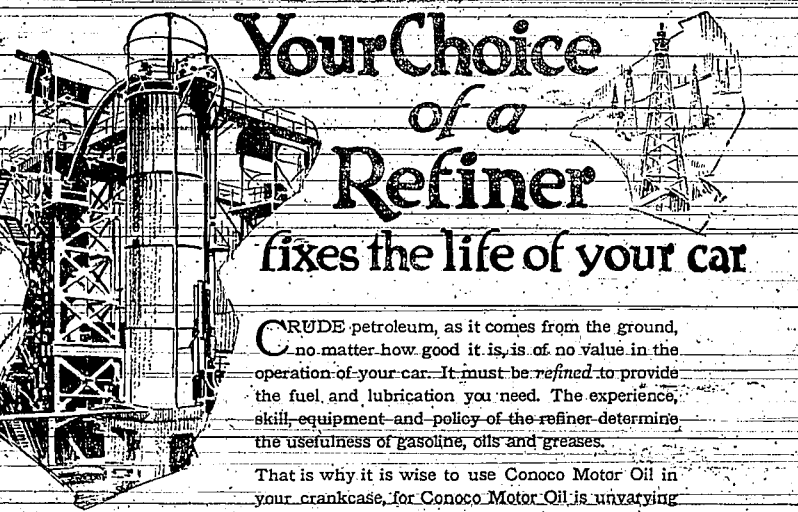

INSTALL CHECK CONTROL CANAL WATER SUPPLY

City Takes Steps to Insure Adequate Supply at All Times

Installation of a check at the filtration plant about 70 feet below the intake is being made by the Twin Falls Canal company during the time the water is turned from the canal. The check will automatically stop the water from flowing into the canal if the water supply is inadequate for the needs of the city.

The check is necessary to insure an adequate water supply for the city during those days when the water must be shut out of the canal. The reservoir holds 4,000,000 gallons which will supply normal needs for about four days. Through installation of the check, an added supply will be held in the canal by a gate five feet high, enough, it is estimated, to carry the city needs for an additional ten days.

The work is being done by the canal company force under direction of Manager Barton Smith at cost which estimates to be about \$200, which will be met from the reserve of the city waterworks department.

The check will be built five feet high and 60 feet long, in three sections, or gates, which rest on concrete abutments between two concrete pillars. It is estimated that it will take a week to complete the job. It

The city commission met yesterday to work on the budget for the next fiscal year. The commission is at their short meeting this evening. Estimate of revenue for the current year, actual and estimated will be about \$101,000, according to tentative figures submitted by the comptroller by the clerk. 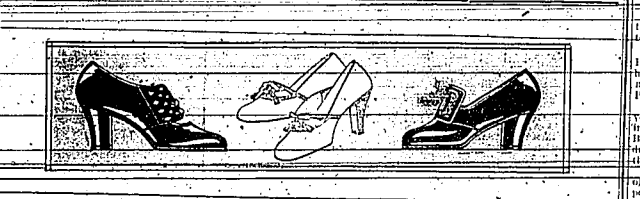
