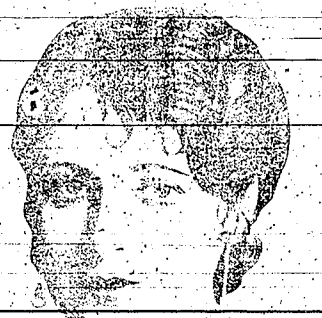

MEXICO, WITH ONLY ONE CANDIDATE, ALSO MAY LOSE ELECTION IN JULY

Elimination of Opposition to Obregon Held Against Him, Some Think; Calles May Add Two Years to His Term

MEXICO CITY—The first month of this election year in Mexico has not proved in any way to clarify the confusing political tangle growing out of the revolution of last October in which two of three presidential candidates were executed. General Alvaro Obregon presumably will be elected without opposition in July of this year and take office Dec. 1, 1929. The only thing apparently to prevent this is the possibility that President Calles may propose his term for two additional years.

The presidential term already has been changed by constitutional amendment from four to six years, with no reelection privilege and it is still uncertain whether or not the president has the right to propose his own term. It is possible that he will propose his own term, but it is believed that he will not.

Such a move, it is believed would not be regarded as hostile to Obregon. The two have been allies for eight years and it is considered entirely likely that he will not object to Calles' proposal.

The fact that all effective political opposition to Obregon has been eliminated is a fact which is not a part of the country, it is contended. Whether that feeling will change between now and election time remains to be seen.

In a country which has been torn with revolution for almost a generation and which is still marked by a change of sentiment overnight is of course obvious. The feeling of reaction which broke out suddenly and unexpectedly was crushed in three weeks and the government has the possibility of any further rebellion of this nature for several years.

It is generally expected that political changes or internal crises may occur within the year that will close before Calles' term expires.

In general Mexico is peaceful, yet the Catholic Church is still a factor in the field in such states as Jalisco and Aguascalientes. The government has been determined to force a peaceful condition but the reports of troubles that have drifted into the capital as a result of the official accounts indicate that the situation there has been extensive and not yet brought under control.

War Minister Joaquin Amaro denied this campaign of anti-religious propaganda to take possession of supervising the troops there for awhile and it is understood that a large part of the federal force is being concentrated in that district.

Such preparations undoubtedly indicate the government's determination to force a peaceful condition but to the foreign observer they are disquieting as the nature of the country and the operations required would seem to preclude a long season.

The arrest of Catholics in Mexico City and other large cities of the country for holding services or for violation of the law prohibiting religious schools also have added to this disquietude. There has been resentment against the government for these acts although in most cases the authorities have hastened to explain that they have no quarrel with the Catholic religion itself and that they are only enforcing the law. In many instances, also, the government has accused the priests and others of inciting rebellion against the government.

Conditions here, however, it is alleged, have been found in the places where worship was conducted. In Jalisco and Aguascalientes, the connection between the revolutionaries and the Catholic cause has been quite clear, although few accuse the Catholic Church of organizing or taking any active part in the movement. It has been contended that priests and bishops were in the field among the rebels but there has been no definite proof of this.

Next to the continuance of this revolt, the most important internal matter in the country is the establishment of improved relations between

the United States and Mexico, due almost entirely to the presence of Dwight W. Morrow as ambassador. United States relations exert a powerful influence on Mexico, indirectly at least, and the Mexican attitude toward the United States is not so guarded.

His accomplishments may be importantly affected by a change in the presidential situation. Should Obregon, for instance, choose to ignore some of the policies which Calles has put into effect respecting the old legislation, Morrow might have to do his good-will work all over again. On the surface the United States cuts no figure in Mexican internal politics. In the background, however, its interests may be a strong determining factor in whatever happens in Mexico during the next year.
