

GENERAL MARKET CONDITIONS SHOW IMPROVEMENT.

Rather amusing and yet a bit pathetic, are the efforts of the pessimists to appear gloomy over the general business situation in this country. Admitting that there are certain "black" spots here and there, the general batting average is high. For instance, Henry Clews & Company, old-established New York banking house, conservative and reliable, referring to business throughout the country says that "the current state of affairs is, on the whole, distinctly satisfactory, all things taken into consideration. Indeed the developments of the past few weeks have gone far toward making it fairly clear that business this year is going to be better than a good many pessimists had originally supposed. Without any question, the outlook at the present moment is distinctly more promising than it was sixty or even thirty days ago. Normal expansion of operations incident to the arrival of the spring season is now well under way. Progress was probably a little slower than last year but indications are now to the effect that activity will persist longer and that the record of the first half of 1928 will be at least as good as the corresponding period of 1927."

Another concern that keeps up with building records, A. W. Straus Co., says that there has been a remarkable and unexpected boom in the construction industry, the figures for new contracts showing a new high level for this season of the year, with prospects never better for spring and summer.

Viewing the automotive industry, the fact is again established that this trade continues great activity, plants in almost all instances running at full capacity, the combined output being largely in excess of the corresponding period of last year. Retail demand is said to be at least 15 per cent greater than in 1927.

With only brief reference to the electrical field it is stated that power consumption is at least ten per cent greater than a year ago with a corresponding increase in the inter-dependent industries.

Car loadings are slightly behind the figures of last year, although the weekly reports indicate that there has been a marked improvement, so much so that the slack may be entirely absorbed within the next month or two. It will be a matter of pride locally to know that the Northwest leads in percentage of gain in car loadings.

As for unemployment, that is said to be disappearing to such an extent that this factor will be turned over to the politicians for use in political campaigns during the remainder of the presidential election year.

No factor has had a more far-reaching influence on Wall Street these last few days than the merger of the Mackay telegraph and cable interests, the Postal, with the International Telephone and Telegraph Company. This consolidation caused an immediate favorable reaction on the market, strengthened by well-founded rumors of more railroad consolidations that are said to be pending, mergers that will particularly affect the great Northwest country.

Prospects are splendid for favorable spring trade and, added to this situation is the plentiful supply of money that is enabling the banks to finance enterprises worthy of credit and that pass the scrutiny of the money lenders.

ANOTHER WOMAN ESCAPES THE GALLOWS.
 Newspapers in this country are commenting on the escape from the gallows of Mrs. Doris McDonald, young wife of a man hanged last Friday in Valley Field prison, in the province of Quebec, for the cruel murder of a taxi driver who was robbed of a pitifully small amount of cash. The wife had been found guilty with her husband and had been sentenced to death. At the last minute came a reprieve and it is this act of clemency that has led some papers to make the assertion that Canada's vaunted hanging to the line in the imposition of the death sentence, is not absolutely iron-clad as supposed.

However, the fact is that nothing other than the statement of the husband that his wife had nothing whatever to do with the actual killing is all that saved the woman's life. Petitions for clemency from women's organizations in many parts of the United States and Canada would have amounted to nothing had it not been for the sworn confession of the men who committed the murder. The known facts imprisonment for life and that means just what it says. Sentiment has nothing to do with the matter and a life sentence across the line is a life sentence and nothing else.

Other Viewpoints

CHURCH ATTENDANCE AND THE RADIO.
 Lewiston Tribune.
 On a recent Sunday the pastor of a Spokane church while the service was in progress, discussed the matter of church attendance. He pointed out the fact of putting the services on the air. An expression of opinion was sought as to the effect of this method of reaching the people, and listeners were invited, if sufficiently interested, to write in the pastor and state their views in the matter, and incidentally it was hinted that contributions from those who had been benefited to help defray the expense, which was considerable, of continuing the arrangement would not be refused. The response was prompt and apparently satisfactory, and the radio service continued.
 "Unfettered enterprise has arisen as to what extent church attendance is diminished by the radio, or whether it encourages people to come to church by awakening their interest and appealing to their conscience. Recently from the pulpit a Chicago minister, discussing the value of the radio as a means of appeal to the church, said:
 "Does radio preaching bring people to church? It is not the hundreds of thousands who follow to hear the church. It is the hundreds of the radio preacher to bring him to God and very often to let the church know that he is not in it. It is only a means to an end. This end is the bringing of the people to church. It is to bring religion into opposition with the life of common men—the very thing which the radio preacher does not intend to do.
 "That radio religion is not the highest type of religion and nobody professing to be a Christian should be of the type of religion because it does not promote community worship—not at all. It is the bringing of the people to the radio preacher who is the task of the radio preacher. It is to bring to the man a religious conviction that is not dead. The common man must not interest himself in religion. It is to interest in all religion. This was not done. Now he is sitting in his overstuffed chair, the dial is most carefully adjusted that he may not lose one word that the radio preacher says. But he is still wearing his slippers. He sends his noisy children from the room because they disturb him. It is altogether selfish, or at all times selfish. But as that interest grows in himself, in his new found faith he will discover that he cannot be both religious and alone. Spiritual growth is not a solitary thing. It is to be shared with others. It is to be shared with the neighbors in the church. This fellow on the air. Presently he will reach for his shoes and go to church, because of the urge of the new impulse within him to join his neighbor in community worship. Will he be at home in the churches when he comes?"
 The element of personal contact is absent in the radio. The preacher speaking to the microphone lacks the sympathy, inspiration, and appreciation that comes from flesh and blood that thousands of ears are tuned to hear him, although he may be sure that thousands of ears are tuned to his appeals at widely separated points. It is undoubtedly true that much of the response to the Spokane church, the words carried afar to silent and unseen listeners are instances of comfort and of cheer.

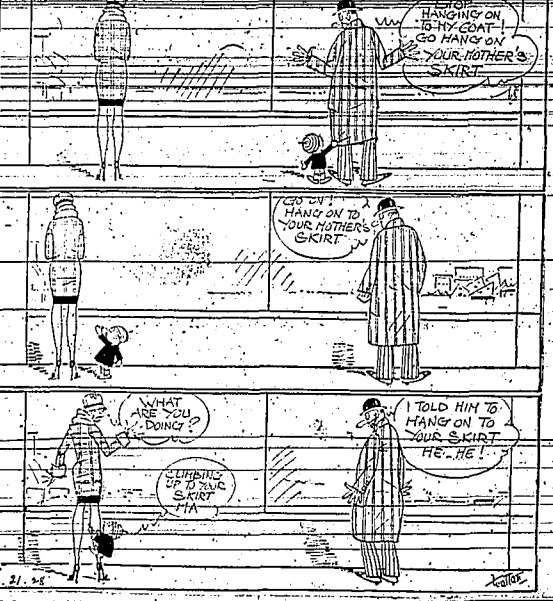
