AGAIN COMES THE PROBLEM OF UNEMPLOYMENT

Secretary of Labor Davis says that there are at least two million men and women out of employment in the United States.

Something for the politicians, the statesmen, the economists and all serious-minded people to ponder over as providing a serious problem in our economic scheme of things.

Allowing for the usual absorption of large drafts of labor with the opening of spring farming operations throughout the North and West, there evidently will still be a surplus of unemployed, so the question facing the government is what to do with those who are out of work and cannot secure employment.

Secretary Davis says the federal public buildings program will take care of a considerable number but even that will not prove an effective remedy. There ought to be other avenues open to those who want to work. A few of the many millions proposed to be spent for battleships, if turned to purposes of expansion and construction, would enable the federal authorities to work wonders. The Times has insisted more than once that the Washington authorities should tackle earnestly and seriously the completion of main national highways across country from the Atlantic to the Pacific and from the Canadian to the Mexican border and to the Gulf of Mexico and Key West. If for no other reason than that of self-defense, such highways are highly desirable. Mobility under such circumstances would be the all-important factor in successfully repelling an enemy attacking from the sea. Wide-well-paved national highways would aid the railway systems in developing the country's resources, agricultural and mineral, and while these were being built, there would be employment for all willing to work. The country needs more highways, deeper waterways and more national parks. Federal funds spent for such purposes would bring a two-fold reward in the providing of national necessities and the solution of the labor problem of the unemployed.
