"The Cubs, Braves, Reds and Robins have strengthened and are going to be holding all the wax."

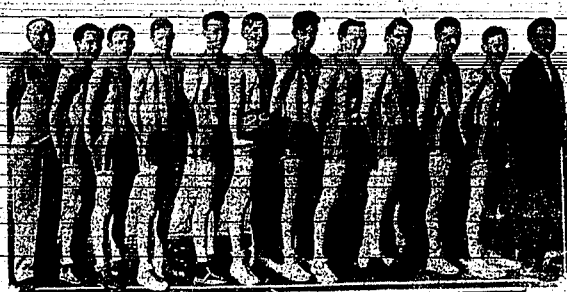
McKechnie's task with the Cardinals is to improve a club which won the league last year, and finished only a game and a half behind the Pirates.

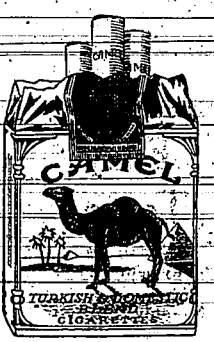
**International Fishery**
