MEXICAN BATTLES END IN HEAVY CASUALTIES

OVER SEVENTY REBELS KILLED

REPORTS STATE FIERCE FIGHTING DEVELOPS IN INTERIOR OF COUNTRY; TOWN ATTACKED

MEXICO CITY, April 5.—Seventy-four rebels, ten agrarians and three federal troops have been killed in battles in the interior of Mexico, according to the capital today said.
Fifty Mexican rebels were killed in the fierce battle at Toluca, in the state of Mexico, the newspaper Excelsior was informed. The rebels, who were fighting for the cause of the state, lost ten men. The rebels were driven off after a hand to hand encounter.

Trace Relations of Qualifications To Remuneration

Forty-seven teachers from the independent class "A" high schools in this county have advanced college work and three have had three years of college work, according to the report of County Superintendent Charlotte Bond. This information is furnished to Commissioner W. D. Vincent of the state department of education, who is compiling data in the certification between professional equipment and salaries of teachers. Twin Falls, Tula, and Kimberly are the class "A" schools.

Ten teachers are employed in the other high schools of the county at Hanley, Hollister, Miramonte and Castleton every one of whom is a college graduate, two having had advanced college work, and the same in five of the rural high schools at Filer and Hellsburg which employ 14 college graduates, one having taken additional work.

In the grade schools at Twin Falls, Kimberly and Lulu, there are employed 14 teachers 15 of whom have had but one year of normal school training, 18 are normal school graduates, 12 have had two years of college, six have had three years and one has taken a degree. In the rural schools the percentage of trained teachers runs high, out of the 100 teachers employed had but a single year of training, while 18 are normal graduates, three have two years and two have three years of college, but none have had the full four years of college work, and none have secured a degree.

The report is submitted as part of an investigation being made by W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education, to ascertain the relationship between professional equipment and salaries.

In high schools of Twin Falls county 30 per cent of the class "A" high school teachers are college graduates and the average salary is \$125 per month. In the rural area graduates where the college graduates are 100 per cent, the salaries are \$176 per month.

In the grade schools where the teachers are 50 per cent normal school graduates the average salary is \$123 per month and in the rural schools where less than 30 per cent are trained, the average salary is \$125 per month. The salary higher pay is perhaps a reflection of the unwholesomeness of the city work may be had, Miss Bond stated.

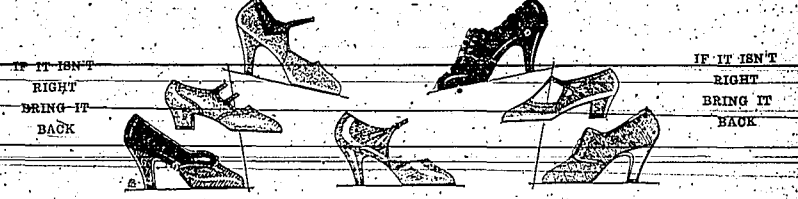

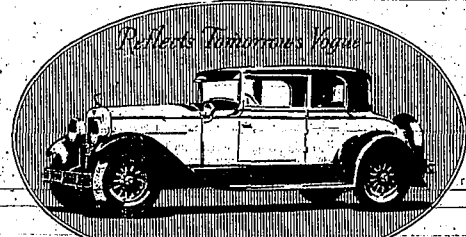

SOUTH IDAHO RATES GO TO FEDERAL BODY

Status of Twin Falls-Rogerson Line Will Be Decided by Interstate Commerce Commission After Report of Examiner Jewell Has Been Completed.

Final decision as to the value to southern Idaho of the connecting line of the Union Pacific Railroad between Twin Falls, Idaho, and Wells, Nevada, where it connects with the Southern Pacific, now rests with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Two full days of hearing and Wednesday were required in taking evidence relating to two complete files by the State of Idaho through the Public Utilities Commission, the first having reference to suit rates in Idaho and the second having reference to the rate on the Twin Falls-Wells short line.

Examiner Burton Jewell of Washington, who presided at the hearings, will submit his report to the Interstate Commerce Commission, based on the evidence and the testimony furnished by the complainants, intervenors and intervenors are to have the privilege of presenting their views before the final decision of the examiner.

There will not be a final decision until the Interstate Commerce Commission has received the report of the Interstate Commerce Commission finally and definitely. The construction of the line of south Idaho as expressed by their State and local representatives, is that the Union Pacific constructed the line of road at a cost approximately \$2,000,000 for the purpose of providing a direct outlet to the San Francisco territory for the products of farm and factory of south Idaho at the same time enabling this section of the State to receive the same facilities with San Francisco supply markets and the constant buying and selling of travel as that of the Palo Alto-Ogden district.

On the other hand the rail lines, take the attitude that the railway between Twin Falls and Wells is nothing more than a branch line and should be recognized as such in the making of rates and in providing passenger and freight service.

Another factor is the widespread interest in the case the fact was revealed that both the Interstate Commerce Commission and the State of Idaho, both Los Angeles and Portland, intervenors in the case made it clear that they would not object to a San Francisco adjustment of rates based on shorter mileage over the Twin Falls-Wells route, provided their interests are given the identical treatment by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Purpose of Short Line

Supplementing the presentation of the Interstate Commerce Commission on Monday by the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce through Joseph S. Wight, secretary, who called attention to the importance of the industrial survey of the Twin Falls region, comprising the counties of Blaine, Cassia, Gooding, Jerome and Twin Falls, were the personal experiences of local citizens and business men. These included J. T. Matzer, district manager for the Pacific Fruit and Produce Company; F. L. Warner, fruit and produce dealer; Joseph H. Weaver, grower and shipper; Harry H. Haffell, city clerk of Twin Falls; B. N. Jensen, manager of the Twin Falls Canning Company; and C. H. Stinson, shipper of honey. These witnesses placed on the stand to put into the record the extent of the growth and expansion of this section of the State and the necessity for the full use of a rail facilities in Wells, would result in a still further development of the State.

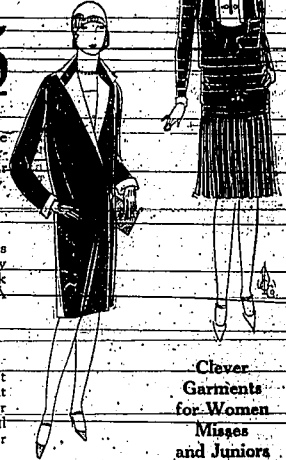

Trace Relations of Qualifications To Remuneration

Thirty-seven teachers from the total of 44 employed in the three independent classes of high schools in this county have advanced college work and three have had but three years of college work, according to the report of County Superintendent Charlotte Pond. This information is furnished to Commissioner W. D. Vincent of the state department of education by compiling data to ascertain relations between professional equipment and salaries of teachers.

In the high schools of Twin Falls, Kimbly and Buhl, there are employed 104 teachers 16 of whom have had but one year of normal school training; 63 are normal college graduates; 23 have had two years of college, 13 have had three years and 11 are

college graduates. Forty-one are employed in the grades of the six other independent classes of high schools in this county but one year training at the normal; 50 per cent, or against 14 per cent in the class "A" districts. Ten of the graduates have had a year of college, six have had two years, three have had three years and one has had four.

In the rural high schools, the percentage of trained teachers runs high, as out of the total of 44, 31 have had, at least, one year of training. There have two years and two have three years of college, but none have had the full four years of college work, and none have secured a degree.

The report is submitted as part of an investigation being made by W. D. Vincent, commissioner of education to ascertain the relationship between professional equipment and salaries.

In high schools of Twin Falls county 80 per cent of the above "A" high school teachers are college graduates and the average salary is \$145 per month. In the rural high schools, where the college graduates are 100 per cent, the salaries are \$176 per month.

In the grade schools where the teachers are 50 per cent normal school trained the average salary is \$127 per month and in the rural schools where less than 30 per cent are trained the salary average is \$125 per month. The slightly higher pay is perhaps a reflection of the unwillingness of the teachers to work in the rural schools if city work may be had, Miss Pond says.

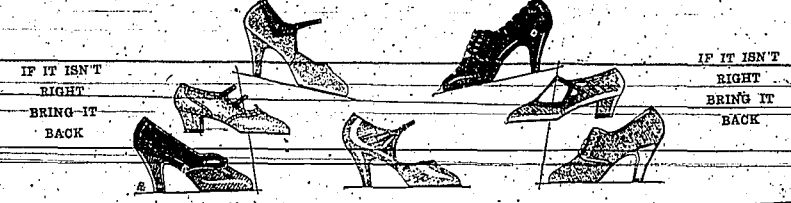

INTERESTING SIDE-LIGHTS ON THE NICARAGUAN SITUATION.

In the mind of the average American citizen there is nothing more than a hazy idea of the present situation in Nicaragua. One faction of the daily press continues to maintain that Uncle Sam has no right whatsoever to be represented in the strife-torn republic by his personal emissaries, known as United States marines. The statement is frequently made that the government of the United States has no business to meddle with affairs in Nicaragua, and that what has been done so far has been the result of pleas and representations of special interests.

With all this in mind, it is interesting to secure what is said to be reliable information that serves to clarify the situation. An authority on Nicaraguan affairs says that the refusal of the Nicaraguan Chamber of Deputies to pass the McCoy electoral bill, providing for American supervision and insuring fairness in the approaching presidential election in that country, is evidence of the fact that the Conservatives under the leadership of Diaz were not so sincere in their expressed desire to Col. Stimson for a fair supervised election. Obviously, it is clear to them that the majority of their fellow countrymen are not in favor of the administration continuing to remain in their hands. This bill was defeated by their efforts. Fifteen of the nineteen who voted for its passage are members of the Liberal Party.

Before the intervention by U. S. Marines the forces of the Liberals were gradually defeating the forces supporting Diaz and the former were approaching the capital city, Managua. Seeing that they were in imminent danger of defeat and overthrow the Conservatives gladly welcomed the Marines of this country, and when it was proposed by Col. Stimson that both parties lay aside their arms and await the outcome of the next election they went along with the Liberals. Now those in power express their gratitude to the United States by refusing to pass a law which makes a fair election possible.

This refusal does not back the statements and contentions concerning the integrity and honesty of Diaz and his regime made by those responsible for the seemingly un-called for intervention by the United States in the affairs of that small country. To state it in a popular phrase, "it leaves them without a leg to stand upon."

Yet the position of the United States is similar to that of one who has crossed a river and burned the bridge. Our word has been given that recognition shall be given to the victorious party of the next election and that election shall be fairly conducted. Yet, since the Chamber of Deputies has refused to pass laws providing for United States supervision of the election in October, it is wondered how this change is to be fulfilled. It has been predicted that Diaz will be called upon to issue an order to the effect that the bill that failed to pass. This prediction brings two questions. Will Diaz give such an order, and if he should, would it be legal?

It has been stated officially that President Coolidge does not know that ratification of American supervision in Nicaragua by Congress was absolutely necessary. On this point, without ratification it becomes necessary to have upon an administration that has been recognized by the United States something that is entirely adverse to its interests.

The situation presents a dilemma that is hard to solve, one in which most any solution leads to further complications.

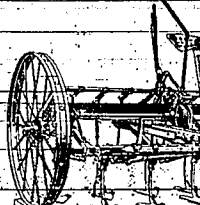

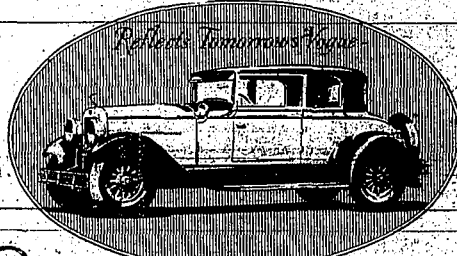

Status of Twin Falls Region Line Will Be Decided by Interstate Commerce Commission After Report of Examiner Jewell Has Been Completed.

Final decision as to the value to southern Idaho of the connecting line of the Union Pacific Railway between the Twin Falls and Weiler divisions where it connects with the Southern Pacific, now rests with the Interstate Commerce Commission.

Examiner Thurston Jewell of Washington, who on Tuesday filed his report, will submit his report to the Interstate Commerce Commission, based on the report of the examiner. 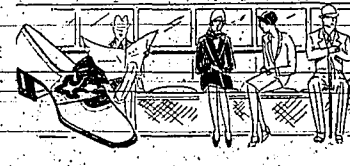

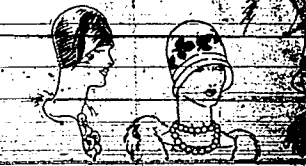
