Deneen has squeaked the Len Small-Frank Smith-William Hale Thompson crowd effectively, Governor Small being defeated by a wide margin by Louis L. Emmerson, the present secretary of state of Illinois. Deneen candidate, Thompson himself lost his post as a ward committeeman but was selected as a Republican delegate to the national convention in Kansas City.

Chicago and the great State of Illinois, have made a good start in re-establishing themselves in the confidence and good will of the country at large. With Emmerson as governor and Otis F. Glenn as United States senator, much of the infamy of the Len Small administration will be forgotten.

Once again we have a demonstration of the fact that the people of America will stand for just so much and that when the limit of patience and endurance is reached, the safety valve pops and the state is wiped clean. ## A FURTHER INCENTIVE TO FEDERAL ROAD BUILDING.

The sooner the Congress of the United States establishes a federal highway department, the better, is the view of leaders of public opinion throughout the country, a view that is spreading rapidly and meeting with general public favor.

Stimulation has been given the suggestion that Uncle Sam ought to get right behind a program of national highway construction in a big way through legislation now proposed in Congress which would, it is said, create a national highway fund of more than four hundred and seven million dollars from money obtained by the United States through the maturing of bonds accepted from France as payment for surplus war material, highway equipment and supplies. It is proposed to distribute this money to the several States on the basis of States so benefiting, contributing not more than twenty per cent of federal highways so constructed.

Those newspapers that are lamenting the extent of unemployment existing at the present time in the United States and who are bewailing this and that thing as radically wrong with the government, had far better get behind such federal highway projects as are proposed since by so doing they will be aiding in securing work for those out of work and at the same time contribute to the wealth and prosperity of the country as a whole.

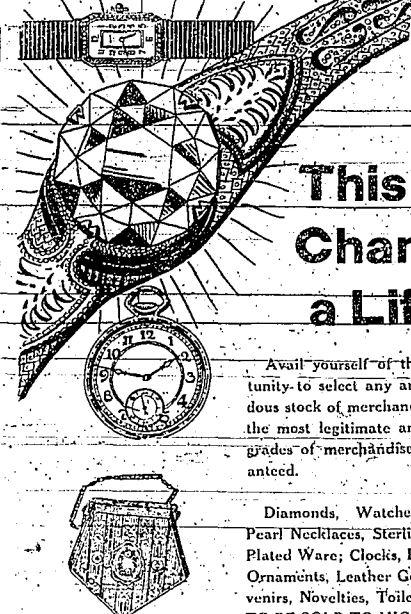

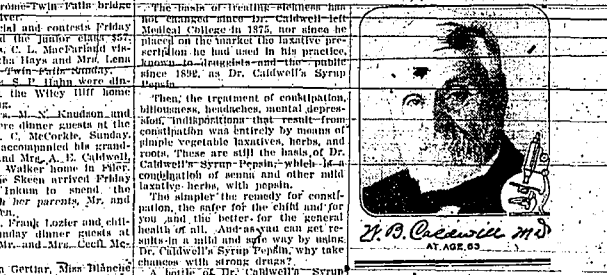

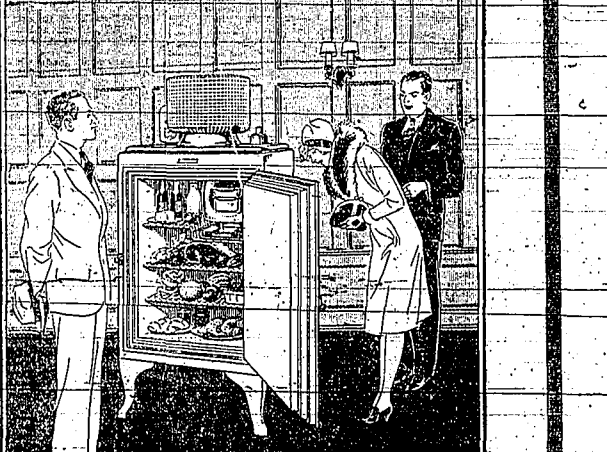
