WALL STREET ON THE EDGE OF A CANYON.

A substantial advance in rates for call money to six per cent, said to be a level not previously obtained since the beginning of 1927, accompanied by the calling of a considerable volume of loans, is believed to indicate the true state of affairs on the New York market.

Yet despite all this, the general trade situation is declared to be favorable, thus running counter to practically all financial experience. "Everybody at all familiar with the situation predicts a "blow-up" when the rabid bull movement that has furnished the newspaper writers unusual "copy" and glaring headlines, comes to an end as it should.

High lights of the past week include a moving up of certain rail stocks as the result of unofficial announcement of railroad mergers or at least rearrangements pending between lines serving the territory from Chicago to New York.

Since Idaho is especially interested in copper, this State being rich in natural supplies of copper ore, it is interesting to note that the condition of the copper market has shown tremendous improvement, there now being an excellent demand for this commodity.

IN THE INTEREST OF A MORE ATTRACTIVE CITY.

Throughout the Twin Falls newspapers Edgar V. Gibson, district horticultural inspector, is urging having not only fruit trees but elm and maple shade trees to make sure those trees are sprayed against pests.

Attention is called to the fact that State laws and city ordinances make it mandatory on all owners of trees and shrubs to keep them free from insect pests and diseases. All that is now necessary is to get in touch with Public Works Commissioner Ralph Smith or Superintendent Harley Raybourn to whom the work of spraying has been delegated.

SLUMP STRIKES WHEAT MARKET

Corn Declines Sharply at Opening But Rallyes Somewhat Later

CHICAGO, April 17.—The long expected slump in a substantially strong wheat market struck today and all wheat prices went into a spectacular decline on an attack of wheat that caused a final rush of selling by traders which nullified most of the gains.

Corn was consistently strong and advanced fractionally, closing 5/8 higher. Oats were strong throughout the day, but broke when wheat declined and finished 3/4 lower. Provisions were generally weaker.

Wheat slumped sharply at the opening on a sudden decline at Liverpool. Shorting there was not a fair rally. Trading then quieted down and was inclined to dullness throughout the remainder of the session.

Wheat and the cash market held unchanged.

Barley and oats in the day with wheat but soon recovered and climbed slightly. Exports continued unfavorably. Both wheat and oat prices receded 1/10 cars, there was no news to prompt the bulk. Cash corn steady.

Oats took new life from recent bulk developments and the futures rose 5/8 on a recovery. Cash prices for the day advanced 1/2.
