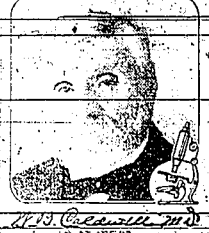

# ALCOHOL FROM IDAHO'S SPUDS NOW IN SIGHT

## Distillery Likely to Be Located in Pocatello Because of Central Location.

A potato alcohol distillery is expected for Pocatello, according to an announcement made by George Panake, promoter, who has been working on the project for the past two months. Twin Falls was first approached on the proposition, growers, bankers and members of the Chamber of Commerce giving the matter consideration and making investigation of its feasibility. Later the negotiations were transferred to Pocatello, where a proposition met with the immediate support of all districts in both the upper and lower Snake river valley.

The organization of the company will be launched within a few days by local men from St. Anthony, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Blackfoot, Burley, Rupert, Jerome and Twin Falls. The promoters have identified their resources to launch the company which will be a joint venture of the growers and processors.

The output of the plant as planned at present is to be alcohol, carbonic oxide and starch food. The alcohol can be sold under contract to local companies who have identified their willingness to contract two and one-half million gallons of that product annually. There is forecast a company to sign the contract. The carbon dioxide is to find its market in the soft drink industry. The starch food, which will probably be handled in dry form, has a high food value and will find a ready market in a stock and dairy country.

It is stated that Pocatello is considered the best location for the plant which will center the potato industry and be so accessible to the largest possible number of processors. All contracts will be handled by the promoters at a favorable rate from every part of the district, and it is estimated that the return from this part of the project per hundred with no expense of packing, will be about \$100. The cost of packing is about \$100 per ton. The only alcohol to be obtained from the potatoes is the starch. The starch is used for the plant have met with the Idaho Falls men who have given the matter interested support and a complete rechecking of all their points to be ready for the fall crop.

# OPTION SUITS CHANGE SALMON BOARD TACTICS

## Bonds May Still Be Issued to Purchase "A" System.

Another step was taken this evening in the direction of the Salmon river section toward straightening out the tangled web of water rights with the decision to relinquish the water alone apartment there to the land. Said the purchase step is to be derived from a sale of bonds which was authorized by the supreme court of Idaho recently. Return of the option followed, which a few weeks ago he conducted their surrender, since the option period originally granted had expired. It is not the intention of the company to abandon their plan to straighten water rights through future tax revenues. The company is to approach the board of directors of legal counsel. They assert that the water supply is not sufficient for more than 20,000 acres.

Lands which it is proposed to purchase to under the "A" system will be the vicinity of Hogaport.

Mr. Kyle is on route to American Falls to make an examination of the stream flowing into the American Falls reservoir for their possibility of providing spawn. The waters of the big reservoir are reported to be overflowing from the spillways at 5:30 now. While in the eastern part of the state he will visit the state hatchery at Ashton.

The close watch that is being maintained over the spawning grounds in Rock Creek that form the nucleus of the Twin Falls hatchery, resulted in the arrest of three young men, Merrett Richardson, W. J. Sutton and M. Drackeburg, who had taken between 25 and 30 fine trout in introducing the violators yesterday afternoon 12 days in the county jail. Judge A. Bailey of the probate court indicated that those taken up for introduction were getting over the full penalty of the law.

Community sentiment is apparently behind the present judgment, since the fish hatchery has become a matter of local pride and the interest in promoting the culture of trout is being evidenced. Those who persist in selfish depredation of the closed streams are causing country, not only to the law, but to a fixed public opinion.

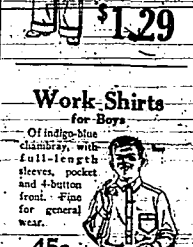

## BIRGER GOES TO HIS DEATH ON GALLOWES

Lord of Underworld Called to Account for Series of Crimes Against Society; Goes to His Fate Defiant of Law and Order; Hanged at 9:51 A. M.

DENTON, Ill., April 19.—The state of Illinois today claimed the life of Harry Birger, notorious hoodlum, hanged at 9:51 a. m. for the murder of Joe Adam, 250-pound mayor of West City, Ill.

With a defiant glare at the long-delayed gallows which finally overtook him, Birger was dropped to an untimely death on the gallows in county jail here at 9:51 a. m.

"It's a beautiful world," Birger said as he walked up the 15 rungs of the gallows and jumped out to the crowd.

Just before Phil Hanna, the White county hangman, took Birger to the gallows he had a final word to say to the crowd and his last words were: "Good-bye."

When he asked "Where is the hangman?" Hanna stepped up, and in his characteristic manner sought equity to apply to the doomed man for the duty he was about to perform.

"That's all right, you don't have to apologize to me, I have nothing against anyone in the world any more."

Arrangement taken Hanna adjusted the noose and at 9:51 the trap was sprung, sending Charles Birger to his fate he defied society for years and then hanged when placed in prison.

## Rabies Situation Watched With Care

Twin Falls county commissioners will be asked to extend the present quarantine regulations for dogs applied to part of Albion precinct, seven miles from town, to include a possible range of two miles south of Albion. This is because of the spread of rabies. Dr. H. H. Crohn indicated today.

Following the killing of the dog on the Davis ranch in Albion, which had bitten several dogs of that vicinity, and the vaccination and quarantine of all the dogs in that neighborhood, reports came from the vicinity of the Houppeland ranch that a dog was active in a suicidal manner. Nothing definite came from this dog, but it was found that two Holstein calves belonging to Mr. Houppeland were killed and high animals were vaccinated and quarantined with the same result.

These animals are not a part of the Albion quarantine herd and will be kept on the farm, two miles from the town, and about three miles from the Albion district.

While there is no known cure for the disease once it is established vaccination is an almost sure preventive.

### SAN FRANCISCO CELEBRATES AN ANNIVERSARY.

Twenty-two years ago Wednesday and today the city of San Francisco was visited by a terrible calamity, a terrific earthquake, followed by a fire that almost completely had the havoc wrought by the upheaval of the earth.

The loss of life exceeded five hundred men, women and children while the property destroyed was estimated at more than four hundred million dollars.

Today San Francisco bears no trace of the wounds of almost a quarter-of-a-century ago; it has grown and prospered because of the enterprise of its people, the city has become one of the mightiest in the nation.

Some of these days south Idaho will be linked with the Golden Gate country by direct rail connection. San Francisco will benefit, the railroads will benefit and so will south Idaho.

### SCIENCE MAY HAVE SOLVED ANOTHER MYSTERY

Press dispatches from Princeton, N. J., state that two Princeton University physicists are convinced they have solved the mystery of the aurora borealis, unknown in the Southland but one of the most inspiring of all sights in the North country.

It is possible that more unanswered questions have been asked about this strange phenomenon of nature than about anything else in the world. To most people the solution of the mystery would be like finding the mythical base of the rainbow, with its pot of gold but these practical scientists believe they are well on the way to a scientific explanation of the gorgeous colors and the light diffusions that inspire awe on the part of all beholders.

Statement is made that the meteoric accident Dr. Gunther Carlo and Dr. Joseph Kaplan reproduced the Northern Lights. They noticed that an electrical discharge into a mixture of oxygen and nitrogen would reproduce the aurora green-spectrum line and aurora red-spectrum line. By way of explanation they have concluded that aurora borealis is the result of the transference of hydrogen energy to oxygen.

That explanation ought to satisfy any reasonable mind. The general public will be inclined to accept the word of the learned Princeton professors.

But after all, "seeing is believing," and the good roads that make every part of the State accessible to its own people, that make for the dissemination of knowledge concerning its resources and geography, are the best possible means for creating first hand knowledge of communities which is followed by a solidarity of purpose and effort among Idahoans.



# ALCOHOL FROM IDAHO'S SPUDS NOW IN SIGHT

### Distillery Likely to Be Located in Pocatello Because of Central Location.

A potato alcohol distillery is being set for Pocatello, according to a statement issued by George F. Cooke, promoter, who has been working on the project for the past two months. Twin Falls was first approached on the proposition, growers, bankers and members of the Chamber of Commerce giving the matter considerable thought and making investigation of its feasibility. Later the negotiations were transferred to Pocatello where the proposition met with the immediate support of all districts in both the upper and lower Snake river valleys.

The organization of the company will be launched within a few days, lead men from St. Anthony, Idaho Falls, Pocatello, Blackfoot, Burley, Rupert, Jerome and Twin Falls having signified their readiness to launch the company which is to be cooperative in nature. Meetings of growers will be held within the next few weeks and arrangements made to handle the full potatoes from all of South Idaho.

Three products:

The output of the plant as planned at present is to be alcohol, carbon dioxide and stock food. The alcohol can be sold under contract to gas companies who have signified their willingness to contract two and one-half million gallons of that product as soon as there is formed a company to own the plant. The carbon dioxide is to be used in the soft drink trade. The stock food which will probably be handled in dry form has a high food value and will find a ready market in a stock and dairy country.

It is stated that Pocatello is considered the best location for the plant which will benefit the potato industry and no be accessible to the largest possible number of growers. All full potatoes will be handled by the mill, at a favorable rate from every part of the district, and it is estimated that the return from this part of the crop will net the growers 10 to 15 cents per bushel.
