A FORTUNE AWAITS SOME INVENTIVE GENIUS.

Officials of Boise, capital city of Idaho, have been carrying on experiments to ascertain the actual quantity of coal falling in and on that city as the result of the general use of bituminous or soft coal.

Boise has a smoke nuisance and means are being sought to abate that nuisance. So tests have been made in eight locations and it has been discovered that an average of approximately eighty-four tons of solid matter to the square mile fell during the month of February. Approximately 30 percent of this was soft.

As is well known, Boise, beautiful little city that it is, is situated in a comparatively small valley so that air currents do not have much opportunity to get in motion. Those who have viewed Boise from the surrounding hills in the early morning, especially during the winter season when domestic and industrial fires are burning in stoves and furnaces, will recall the fact that sometimes only the tall dome of the State Capitol and a few of the taller buildings can be seen. But Boise is not dismayed. The investigating commission in making its report, suggests that there are certain kinds of coal which can be secured that do not give off excessive smoke; however that would not seem to solve the problem. Many big factories in all sections of the country are using smoke consumers. It would seem reasonable to suppose that if inventive genius has been able to solve the smoke problem in the larger commercial and industrial enterprises, there ought to be a solution found for the kitchen stove and the family furnace.

Incidentally Boise has no monopoly of the smoke nuisance. In proof of that statement all one has to do is to motor a mile or two south of Twin Falls on a cool, quiet morning and look back over the city. Yes, we have a smoke problem too that offers quite as good a field for solution as almost any other place except that Twin Falls does have an occasional "breeze."

New Courses in Business and
Vocational Subjects Of
Fered Students:

Formal arrangement of the curriculum has been completed for the year being offered next year to the students of the Twin Falls high school has been put into shape for distribution among the patrons of the district by Sept. 1. It is the intention of the school board to have parents and students give careful consideration to the selection of the preferred courses and that this be followed by all students throughout the high school course.

Some students desire a general preparatory course, general or classical studies, while others prefer certain vocational courses such as agriculture, home economics, and commerce arts, or business, but as the students, they desire to receive the benefit of all other offerings. Only those who plan to enter college will like to have the advantages of a high school education without having to pay the expense of a college education. mathematics, science, and certain other in the courses ordinarily required for college entrance.

To all of these students Twin Falls high school offers a varied program consisting of seven courses, the first 6 listed below, making the ordinary college entrance requirements.

Graduation from high school

graduation course does not satisfy college entrance requirements of all colleges, but admits to some schools in which entrance requirements are designed for students who plan to continue their formal education after high school graduation.

All courses will require 32 credits to graduate. All students except the high school graduation course require that 30 of these 32 credits shall be in solid subjects. Only 28 credits will be required for the high school graduation course. The subjects which are not classified as solid are orchestra, band, chorus, and physical training, and suitable credit can be given for one year of English and two years of foreign language, American history, and civil government are required in addition to the graduation course.
