BRUINS TAKE SUB-DISTRICT TRACK MEET

State Record for Half Mile Relay Shattered by Bruin Team

The state record for the half mile relay was broken by the Twin Falls high school relay team yesterday afternoon at the sub-district track meet, Alford, Idaho. The Bruin team, running the distance in 1:34.9, broke the record established by Rurit in 1925 of 1:36.7.

Twin Falls high school took the lead in the 100-yard dash with Ed White, who came second with 23 points and Duhl third with 20 points. Both the Bruin and Perrine teams ran faster than they have ever before on this track. Robertson pupping the high hurdles in 16.4 seconds, less than 15 tenths of a second slower than the state record. Alford took the low hurdles in 22.5 which is a record faster than the three ever before run on this track.

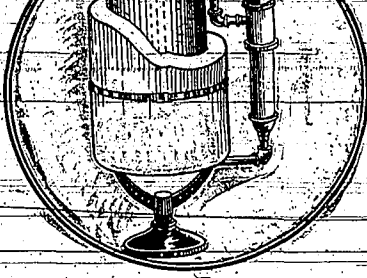

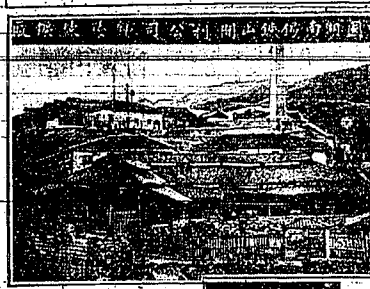

The Romance of Antimony



Antimony is one of the metals that has few uses in industry. Yet our American daily newspaper is printed without the help of antimony, which, with lead and tin, forms the metal from which type is made. The use of antimony dates back a great many centuries. It was employed by the ancients to color hair and the eyebrows and to make the eyes seem larger; all of which were thought to be marks of beauty. In the middle ages antimony was used as a medicine and as early as 1500 A. D. it was used in type metal and for engraving and printing. Since that time its use has continued to the present day.

While this metal produces many of the raw materials it uses, there are a number of commodities which it can secure only from the other side of the globe. Among these is antimony. Although the world's demand for this metal is not large, this country uses more of it than does any other, and it is requiring more each year.

Most of the antimony ordinarily comes from Hunan, China, a province noted for its rugged beauty. During the Great War, however, when large quantities of antimony were needed to make bullets and when the regular west end of the tinners' strike and a powder in smoke shells, some of the Western States opened antimony mines. But ordinarily these mines cannot produce in competition with foreign supplies.

On the largest mass of the silver, white, hard, brittle metal in this country is in the hills of Hunan, China. Below melting antimony with lead in one of the plants of the Western Electric Company preparatory to sheathing telephone cables.

It is to harden and strengthen the lead sheath of the cables which the Western Electric Company manufactures to carry telephone wires under the streets and on lines of poles. By making the shells into thin ribbed lead and one part antimony they are well protected against breaks and tearing by friction. While the percentage of antimony is small, it serves the purpose.

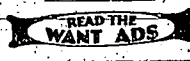
