### MISSIONARY MURDERED BY NATIONALISTS

Dr. Walter F. Seymour Shot Down in Cold Blood While on Errand of Mercy—Bad Situation Developing That Calls for Action—By Washington.

6,000 REPORTED SLAIN  
BERLIN, April 25.—An unconfirmed Hankow, China, dispatch to the Tagblatt reported today that 6,000 persons were killed when bandits raided the town of Kingting, in Huph province.

DR. SEYMOUR KILLED  
SHANGHAI, April 25.—Dr. Walter F. Seymour, an American missionary at Taining, was murdered by Nationalist soldiers while engaged in a work of mercy, national information received here today.

SITUATION LOOKS DARK  
PEKING, April 25.—Reports here today told of the capture of one American missionary and killing of two others in Shantung province.

The American legation received word that J. C. Osborn, American missionary, of the Church of the Nazarenes, at Cheuching, had been arrested by Gen. Peng Yu Hsiang and sent to Kailash in southern China.

The report to the legation did not indicate why Osborn had been arrested and deported.

There was also an unconfirmed report in Peking that Chinese soldiers had killed two American Methodist missionaries at Yenchow in Shantung province.

At present there are 25 American missionaries in the province.

WASHINGTON TAKES ACTION

## MAKING CONCRETE HIGHWAYS PAY THEIR WAY

The legislature of the Canadian province of Alberta has under consideration at this time a bill that will be of general interest to all motorists on both sides of the boundary line.

This bill seeks to incorporate the Alberta Trackways, the corporation to be authorized to construct a twenty foot wide concrete highway on which "fares" will be charged to automobiles between Calgary and Banff, Calgary, and the international boundary line entering either Montana or Idaho, and from Calgary to Edmonton. This proposal has already received the approval of the Railway Committee of Alberta—and if passed—it is believed that construction of these highways can be completed by the autumn of 1930.

An idea of the permanency of the enterprise may be had from the announcement that the estimated cost per mile between Calgary and Banff across the Rockies runs anywhere from \$35,000.00 to \$50,000.00 per mile depending on the grades and cuts and the bridges that will have to be built. This section of the project will cost not less than \$2,500,000.00.

Emphasis is placed on the statement of those back of the plan that the concrete highway will be eliminated from the classification of toll-roads for the reason that users would not be compelled to use the concrete but have the option of using the free-graveled highways built by the Provincial authorities and the Federal Government.

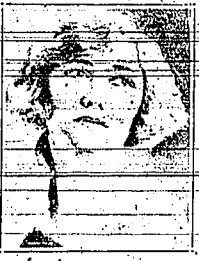
# PRIVATE TIP OF VALUE TO FRIEND WIFE

### Scientists Discover Why Husbands Turn Over So Often in Their Sleep

WASHINGTON, April 23.—The findings of the National Academy of Sciences here brought their annual meeting to a close yesterday after learning that water is built up over husbands' turn over in their sleep more often than wives, and other useful things.

Four of the eminent men of science, noted here with honors, the William Hammond Wright of Lick observatory, won the Henry Draper medal for original research in astronomy; Prof. Walter Egan of the University of London won the Agassiz medal for astrophysics; Prof. A. Perrine Smith of Stanford university possessed the Mary Clark Thompson medal for work in physics and geology; and Charles V. Chapin of the Providence, R. I., health department won the George W. Kober award. Most important of the resolutions was that concerning the making of matter. Dr. Robert Andrews Millikan, Nobel prize winner and California physicist, told how he won the national high in the world in his experiments and explained the Arden to discover what caused cosmic rays, which come to earth with enough momentum to penetrate 18 feet of lead. He also discovered that the cosmic ray spectrum is not continuous, like light, but broken and that the rays are built up in the starry galaxy which positive electrons are formed from the heat of hydrogen, and negative ones, which are the species of electricity, combine to create the common electric current.

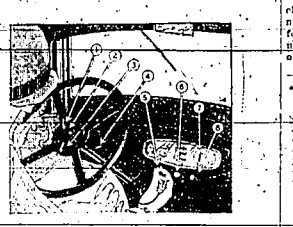
