AWFUL SLAUGHTER IN NATION'S MOURNFUL HOMAGE TO HERO

BANDIT HORDE SLAYS WOMEN AND CHILDREN

Heavy Property Loss Also Said to Have Occurred When Deserter From the Warring Nationalist and Southern Armies Swoop Down on Defenseless.

SHANGHAI, April 27.—More than 7,000 persons were slain by a band of bandits in the region of Kingmen, according to a dispatch received here today.

Persons of all ages, including many women and children, were reported to have been victims of the bandit attack.

The scene of the bandit attack was believed to have been the same as that in which the Nationalist and Southern armies have been engaged in a vicious struggle for the past two weeks.

The Nationalist army made rapid advances on Shanghai and there have been numerous reports of desertions from the Nationalist forces.

In front of the armory the procession halted and the military regiment lined up on both sides of the entrance coming to present honors.

Streets from Grand Central to the Armory were lined with people who turned their heads reverently as the casket passed.

At the funeral home, the body was placed in a casket and the funeral home was visited by thousands of people.

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Rep. Madden Drops Dead In Washington D. C. Office

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Representative Martin Madden, chairman of the House appropriation committee, dropped dead in his office today.

Madden's death was due to angina pectoris, hardening of the arteries, it was said by Representative Stroh of New York, a physician who was called in after the veteran legislator collapsed.

Madden had served in congress continuously for 22 years as the Republican representative from the 11th Illinois district, Chicago. He was first elected to the 60th congress.

Madden was 73 years old. His majestic white head was a landmark in the House for years. Barnabe Madden was born in Darlington, England, March 20, 1855. He went to work at the age of 10 in the stone business.

MOVIE INDUSTRY UNDER FIRE OF FEDERAL GUNS. Leading Corporations Are Alleged to Indulge in Illegalities.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The justice department today instituted equity suits in the United States district court at New York against ten motion picture distributors and producers to break up alleged unfair practices in the motion picture industry.

Ten picture corporations, 32 film boards of trade, and the Motion Picture Association of America were named as defendants.

The suits are designed to test validity of agreements between distributors and exhibitors, and of the operation of credit committee on film boards of trade.

The suits are directed particularly against the practice of "renting" the industry by boards of arbitration, and enforcement of decisions of arbitration boards.

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BENNETT LAD TO REST WITH SOLEMN RITES

WASHINGTON, April 27.—The body of Floyd Bennett, sacrificed to the ends of air courtesies, was brought to the national capital for burial among the heroes of a nation.

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## How Much Water Should Baby Get? A Famous Authority's Rule

Baby specialists agree nowadays that the first six months of a baby's life must have three ounces of fluid per pound of body weight daily. An eight pound baby, for instance, needs 24 ounces of fluid daily. The amount of fluid needed by a breast fed baby is best determined by weighing him before and after feeding for the whole day; and it is easily calculated for the bottle fed baby. This rule is not a hard and fast one, but it is a good one to follow.

## FRANCE SETS PRECEDENT OF WORLD WIDE IMPORTANCE.

The government of France proposes to try out a plan that will at least make a start toward the elimination of poverty and distress. The French government under Premier Poincare has adopted a national insurance plan which provides for the raising of a fund of \$200,000,000 annually through the collection from all workers and employers of 10 per cent of each worker's wages.

The politicians on this side of the Atlantic would have a sweet time playing with a political plum of this type. It is to be doubted if there would be a favorable reaction to such a proposition on the part of the people of the United States, but that does not mean that national insurance is not feasible and practical in not only France, but in Great Britain, Germany and other European countries.

## CONGRESS MAY INVESTIGATE UNEMPLOYMENT.

Quite timely and in order is the resolution introduced simultaneously in the House of Representatives and in the United States Senate yesterday by Representative Jacobson of New York, Democrat, and Senator La Follette of Wisconsin, Republican, providing a joint congressional committee to investigate unemployment in this country. This committee will be composed of three members of the Senate and House of Representatives on education and labor. Its main purpose would be to ascertain continuously the fluctuation of labor employment and to consider the proposal to establish unemployment insurance.

It is quite true that the agricultural industry is handicapped by the industrial east under the protective system. But that does not mean that industrialists are actually afraid of western prosperity, as Senator Capper intimates. The plain truth of the matter is that the eastern congressmen have failed to convince the business-leaders even of their own section that they have a remedy for the ills of agriculture.

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## WOMAN'S PART WORLD AFFAIRS GETS EMPHASIS

### National League of Women Voters Adopting a Wise Program.

By JAMES K. MARTINDALE. (Continued from Page 1.) CHICAGO, April 27.—The day, carefree coed, and the tolling, underfoot woman will share the attention of the National League of Women Voters for the next two years.

The League will try to solve world problems for the woman in industry and use its influence to obtain better working conditions for factory workers.

The League's study program for the next two years includes a study of the general convention of the League, which represents 1,000,000 American women.

In the industrial study the League will analyze into categories the various methods of wage fixing and study the effect of minimum wage legislation upon women workers.
