LINDBERGH PLANS SECOND EUROPE H. F. SINCLAIR FINALLY TELLS HIS STORY

TRANS-ATLANTIC JOURNEY TO BE MADE IN FOUR HOPS STARTING FROM ST. JOHNS

Tour of Asia May Be Included in Itinerary Mapped Out for Famous Aviator, and His Companion Who May Be Major-Lieutenant of the Army Air Corps. Flight Will Be Made in Special Ford Tri-Motored All-Metal Airplane Beginning Early Part of June; Many Foreign Invitations.

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has completed his plans for a flight across the Atlantic and an aerial tour of Europe and probably Asia this summer, it became known here today. The trans-oceanic flight will be made in four hops and will follow a far northern route. The hop-off from the North American continent probably will be made from St. Johns, Newfoundland, early in June.

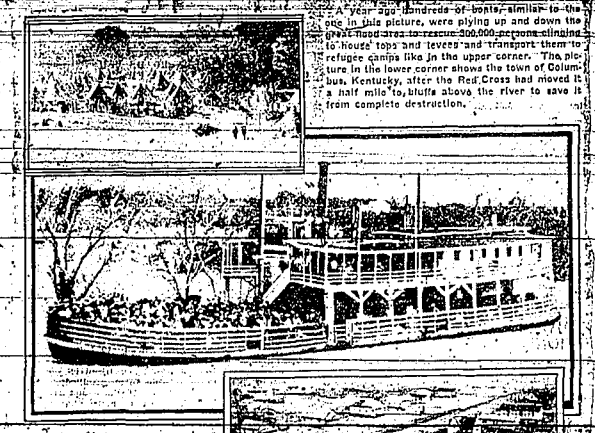

CHICAGO, May 1.—Wheat futures broke sharply on the report of a seasonal decline which carried prices 3/4¢ to 1/2¢ lower at 11:30 a. m. and 1/2¢ to 1/4¢ lower at 1:30 p. m. Yesterday's continued buying was content by the dip and forced to sell contracts at the low level. Trading was extremely active and rapid. 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TWIN FALLS PREPARED TO EXTEND HOSPITALITY TO SUMMER TOURISTS

The Chamber of Commerce has been authorized to extend its membership and the accommodations offered at the tourist hotels as well as the increasing quality of excellence. Accommodations at the hotels is always within a narrow limit and one of the first big improvements in the natural growth of the town will be a large increase in date hotels. There are many unutilized numbers of that being begun next month, there is nothing definite as to their number.

Tourist parks, however, are increasing in number and capacity and are reaching such standard of convenience and comfort that compared with the park of three or four years ago, they are positively a luxury.

C. A. Dickford is pushing the work of the new park at the west end of Main avenue, and the new construction with lavatory and hot and cold shower baths as well as a service station and rest room. It is in Mr. Dickford's intention to build 20 cabins on this site which is situated on a hillside overlooking the main highway and gravel driveway. This is the location which local people have named for the season to come. Since the private tourist parks multi-million.

W. F. Moore has purchased the site of the former City Tourist park just south of the Shell station at the end of Main avenue and just north of the "Twin Falls Tourist Park". There are 200 acres ready for use. Four new ones recently being built and several more are to be situated in an orchard.
