WAR CLOUDS OVER CHINA WASHINGTON MAY INTERVENE IN CHINA

JAPANESE CABINET IN TOKYO AUTHORIZES THIRD MILITARY EXPEDITION SENT TO CHINA

Gravest Move in Recent Chinese History Made Today When Japanese Forces Seized Tsingtao-Tsinan Railway Line in Shantung Province, An Action Regarded By Military Observance As Amounting to a Virtual Declaration of War.

MORE TROOPS ORDERED
TOKYO, May 5.—The cabinet today decided to send a third military expedition, consisting of 18,000 men, to China.

EXTREMELY SERIOUS MOVE
PEKING, May 8, 8:30 p. m.—The gravest move in recent Chinese history was made today when Japan formally announced the seizure of the Tsingtao-Tsinan railway in Shantung, where Nationalist troops are driving toward Peking.

The seizure was regarded for foreign military observers here as a virtual declaration of war.

Simultaneously with the announcement came news that Japanese troops comprised at least 10,000 men and the 3,000 Japanese troops defending the foreign quarter. When fighting was resumed, the Nationalists demanded immediate evacuation of Tsinan and a zone extending for seven miles each side of the railway.

The Nationalists troops, it was reported, have taken the offensive against the Japanese forces. Japanese intervention in China long has been a subject of international interest in Shanghai and Manchuria.

United States Minister John Van A. MacCurry only a few weeks ago effected a friendly settlement of the incident with the national government, whose headquarters are at Nanking.

There is no doubt that the Nanking incident, however, was a comparatively minor affair in comparison with Tokyo's seizure of the railway.

Foreign military observers here interpreted the move as a virtual declaration of war on the part of Japan under Chiang Kai-Shek.

NATIONALISTS START ATTACK
TOKYO, May 8.—One hundred thousand Chinese Nationalist troops started an attack on Japanese troops at Tsinan and Gen. Chiang Kai-Shek, commander in chief of the Nationalist army, was reported to have been killed.

The Chinese general, according to reports, was unable to control his troops. The fighting is continuing in Tsinan. The Aung Shih-shu, Tsinan correspondent reported, that the Nationalist army is being retrained by the Chinese government.

ANGOLA, Ind., May 8.—Seven well-dressed bandits today robbed the First National bank here a \$15,000. The robbers entered the town at 10 p. m. and went directly to the home of C. G. Cox, president of the bank, where they held him and the bank president for five hours until D. H. Gaudin, cashier, entered at 11 p. m. and was released.

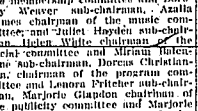

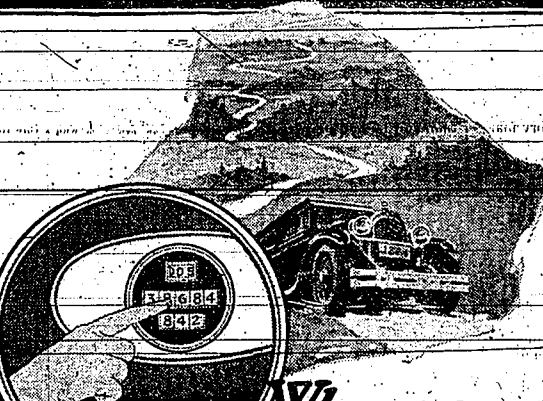
