NATIONAL LEAGUE ASK LEAGUE TO HELP

APPEAL MADE TO MEMBERS LEAGUE NATIONS BASED ON INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Questionable Whether League Can Act Because of Fact That Nationalist Government Is Not a Member—Even the Recognized Government of China; Dr. Wu Sailing From France to Interview Secretary Kellogg to Lay Case Before Washington Government.

WOMAN MISSIONARY KILLED BY CHINESE
PEKING, China, May 11.—W. T. Ho, American Methodist missionary at Tsinan, has been murdered by Chinese troops, the American legation was advised today.
The murder occurred in Tsinan on April 29, the reports reaching here said.
There had been rumors that the American had been killed but official reports of confirmation had been delayed.

SUMMARY OF SITUATION
WHY JAPANESE hold the Tsinan city and the Tsinan-Tsingtao railway after the Japanese troops in which casualties were severe, the Chinese Nationalist government appealed to the league of nations to intervene.
Japan showed every determination to carry through her announced intention of protecting her colonies and her interests in Shantung province. She charged that Nationalist troops, who she lived, and sending a bullet through his head, fell dead on the spot. She also occupied the city and was looted Japanese buildings and killed Japanese subjects.

The Nationalist government, in its appeal to the League, decried the charges and Japanese troops, and by making impossible demands of the Nationalist government without waiting for Japanese attacks on the Nationalist soldiers.

The Manchester Guardian's Tsinan correspondent, eye witness to the fighting, said in a dispatch to the cable that he doubted whether the truth ever would be known.
"My opinion," he said, "is that the presence of Japanese troops and some 20,000 Nationalist troops, which victory created an atmosphere which rendered some kind of an explosion inevitable.
Further fighting at Tsinan is threatened at any time, although Nationalist appeals to have been refused by the League. Their forces are still superior in numbers, though almost completely inferior in equipment and discipline. Japanese airplanes are there."

CAUSE FOR APPEAL
GENEVA, May 11.—The Chinese Nationalist government today appealed to the League of Nations against Japanese intervention in Shantung province.
The National government's appeal was made under paragraph 2, article 11, of the League Covenant, which grounds that the Shantung situation was an infringement to disturb international relations.

The League secretary immediately telegraphed the text of the Chinese appeal to the League of Nations, and the League council, or governing body.
It was extremely doubtful, however, whether the League could act on the appeal because the Nationalist government is not a member of the League and is not the recognized government of China.
If the Northern government at Peking should support the charges, or even state League membership, the League would call the council's attention to the situation, or if Japan herself requested the League to intervene, action would be possible.

The appeal was made direct from National government of the Nationalist government.
It was complained that Japan was sending a new Chinese government, Shantung and that they were committing acts of war.
The appeal called for Japanese membership in the League and requested the League to intervene in the situation.

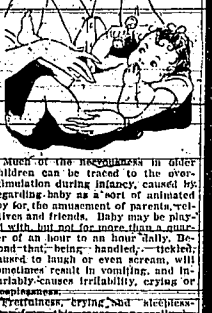

State Bureau To Co-operate With Co. Welfare Work

Twin Falls will become a health center for infants and children of preschool age. If the plans of the Twin Falls County Welfare Association and those of the department of child hygiene are made effective.

A meeting will be held this evening with Mrs. Geo. Brubaker, chairman of the health center, at the home of Dr. Emily Bolcom and Mrs. Ewen, director and assistant director of the state department of child hygiene will confer with Mrs. Ed Gaffney, president of the Parent Teachers Association, Mrs. J. J. Peroutka, Mrs. Fred Walters, Elnora Lott, secretary of the Salvation Army and others who are interested in preparing plans and holding regular clinics at the county hospital, at which subnormal children will receive examination looking toward treatment.

At present Ada county is the only one in the state to take advantage of the federal welfare fund which the state department, but if the Twin Falls county prove successful, the service will be extended to other counties as fast as the local facilities may be developed.
