THE NATION ABOUT TO UNDERTAKE A REAL TASK

It is altogether likely that the entire country is in sympathy with the national program of Mississippi river flood control.

Signing of the flood control bill that has just been passed by Congress and approved by President Coolidge, makes immediately available approximately \$100,000,000 out of a total of \$325,000,000 covering a period of ten years.

A graphic map of the area draining into the Mississippi appears in a recent issue of the Literary Digest. This map, naturally causes amazement because so few people realize the fact that practically all the region from the Continental Divide, which borders Idaho, eastward to the Alleghany and Appalachian region, dumps its waters into the Mississippi basin.

Probably this first appropriation will not be sufficient to meet the situation but it will, at least place the country in a position to know just what will be necessary to keep the Father of Waters within bounds.

AMAZING SCOPE OF THE ILLICIT LIQUOR TRADE

If there is any one element in this country that will force the government to undertake the sale of liquor along lines similar to that enforced across the Canadian border, it is the strongly entrenched liquor ring.

The average layman has little or no comprehension of the magnitude of the organization which makes it possible for those who want liquor to have their order filled and that goes not only in Idaho but in every section of the country.

The most amazing statement comes from the city of Windsor, Ontario, just across from Detroit, Michigan, to the effect that a liquor ring with capital of approximately one-half billion dollars is actually operating export warehouses along the Detroit river.

It appears that a giant merger has been formed, embracing virtually all the brewery and distillery interests in the Dominion of Canada and it is said that it is a most powerful organization that is carrying on a systematized delivery of Canadian liquor into United States territory.

The Windsor situation is just another reminder that the American people will not be denied that which they want if it can be had.

THE LESSON THAT IS NEVER LEARNED

Poor humanity refuses to be taught that even the most stoutly built automobile is no match for a railroad train.

Only a few days ago in a city down East, eight people were instantly killed as a result of a foolish auto race indulged in by the occupants of two cars that rushed headlong into a railroad train at a grade crossing.

What a strange trait, or perhaps a better word is perversity, that causes people to run into danger when there is no excuse and no reason. It seems incomprehensible that such an occurrence could happen but the incident only goes to show that the preachments of safety first cannot be abandoned nor ignored.

Railroad engineers here and elsewhere can tell amazing stories of reckless disregard for human life on the part of motorists who have never yet learned that it does not pay to "beat the train." Many an engineer has prematurely gray hairs in his head because of the foolishness of those who think it smart to race a locomotive and try to dart across a grade crossing ahead of the train.
