POSSIBLY AN OPEN DOOR TO WORLD PEACE

Former Premier Ramsay MacDonald of Great Britain goes a long way when he declares that "the day the United States anti-war treaty is signed, armies and navies of the world will shrivel." This is the substance of a statement made by the former Labor premier in addressing a luncheon gathering of the American Chamber of Commerce in London.

Amplifying his first statement the British statesman added this significant utterance: "Secretary of State Kellogg's proposal to outlaw war was a magnificent declaration. If Europe does not want war she does not need to have it. The proposal would prevent nations from contemplating war, and prevent any nation from threatening war."

Evidently the good work already done by Secretary of State Kellogg is bearing fruit. At least some of the nations across the sea are doing some real thinking; the light of a better understanding of the real motives of this country are perhaps being better understood than ever before, certainly the taking of a strong stand by Great Britain in favor of the Kellogg proposals ought to have a tremendous influence on smaller nations who may still be holding out because of misunderstanding, fear and prejudice.

MacDonald puts the situation bluntly and decisively when he says: "If Europe does not want war she does not have to have it." So there we have authoritative evidence that if Europe gets into another mess it will be the fault of the politicians and those with selfish aims and purposes to serve. Certainly it will not be through the channel of the masses who toil and sweat to obtain their daily bread.

This country may yet be able to render the world a service greater and broader than any in all the history of mankind.

FEDERAL RESERVE ACTS AS A STEADYING INFLUENCE

It was quite evident from yesterday's market reports that officials of the Federal Reserve system are bringing pressure to bear in order to prevent wild-cattling in the investment market. Certainly some sobering influence is necessary if disaster is to be averted. Yet despite all this, business continues on the up-grade, the quarterly report of the Federal Reserve Board pointing out that manufactures have steadily increased, credit for this going to steel and to automobile manufacturing while building operations also get some degree of credit.

In the special groups, copper is a leader largely because of foreign demand with prices holding up exceedingly well.

Rumors of more railway systems is serving to strengthen the confidence of the public in rail stocks, added interest being given by the action of the Interstate Commerce Commission in permitting the Chesapeake & Ohio and the Pere Marquette systems to get together.

Crushed and broken-hearted over the cruel slaying of his son Bobby by Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, the boy's father, the late Jacob Franks of Chicago, has left a fund of \$100,000 for the purpose of giving "pleasure, help and encouragement to boys."

It may well be assumed that the poor old man, all the joy taken out of life, felt that there was nothing much left to live for except to try to bring some measure of joy and happiness to others. All his wealth, his palatial home and all the comforts of life meant nothing with the son out of the picture. His was a gloomy future so he probably turned his thought in the direction of making it possible for boys like his little Bobby to get the most out of life denied his son.

The world will hope that the Franks Fund will prove a blessing to many boys who may come within the influence of its beneficent purposes.

Twin Falls Beans Are Being Canned In Big Factory

Great Northern beans, grown in the Twin Falls district, canned by the Van Camp Canning Co. are being distributed today by the Southern Idaho Bean Growers Association to the members of Twin Falls.

Prepared in the same manner and season as the well known baked beans which this company has marketed for the past forty years, the Idaho beans are larger and sweeter of flavor than those used.

About four years ago the association sent to the Van Camp company a bag of beans asking that they be included in the company's line of products. The company declined at that time, but the association has since then been building their business, and this change was indicated.

During April of this year, the purchasing agent for the company contacted by one of the great Northern bean growers and the association included a few extra beans with the request that they be canned and returned to his place for distribution. These are the beans just returned and distributed today at the factory.

Only are received for this particular brand. It may be possible to secure them from the factory, though at this time none are in the wholesale stocks of the city.

W. C. Gearty, purchasing agent for the Seattle factory during a late visit here, said that about 200 carloads of beans annually, which is about twice as many as were here during the last season. This means about 4,000,000 number two cans of beans.

No statement has yet been received from the factory, but the purchase of 40 carloads following the receipt of approval of the quality and marketability. No advertisement of the Idaho beans appears on the label. Samples were sent to two other factories in the east at the same time and they were not in favor of the plan, no orders have followed.

Father And Son Killed By Bank Robbers Today In Raid at Lamar, Colo.

LAMAR, Colo., May 22.—The father and son of the best known banker in the city were killed today in a bank robbery. The father, E. A. Rosengren, and the son, C. Langgren, were slain by five bandits who robbed the institution shortly after 1:30 p. m. today.

The bandits approached the bank at 1:30 p. m. and four of them entered. All were masked.

The father was ordered to get the safe to open it and stay there. The bandits covered the other father with a gun. Suddenly the other father fired at one of the bandits and another was wounded.

The father was killed by the bandits with a bullet through his head. He was taken to a hospital where he died.

A sheriff's posse was organized immediately and less than 16 minutes after the shooting a number of automobiles were in pursuit.

The bandits released Langgren three miles west of Lamar and returned to their hideout. The amount of loot taken is unknown.

The older Parrish was in his office when the bandits entered. He was killed by a bullet through his head and died at the scene.

Police say they have reports that one of the men wounded but not severely enough to prevent him from leaving with his companions.

Miss Myrtle Garrett and Miss Vivian Potter, two women employees of the bank, were not molested during the robbery. The bank was not damaged.

Reports received here from the sheriff's posse at 2:30 p. m. said they were gaining on the bandits and expected capture of the robbers momentarily.

Hold "Black and White" Day Program This Morning

Approximately 100 dairymen of Twin Falls county were in attendance at the "Black and White" day program at the L. J. Teasdale farm this morning and most of them declared it the most educational meeting ever held.

D. L. Fourt, field dairyman, gave a splendid demonstration of bull and cow judging. He chose the Holsteins and pointed out to the men present the favorable and unfavorable points.

This demonstration was followed by a judging contest by selected program. Eight cows were selected, four in each of the two classes. The dairymen were given cards and registered their judgment on the cows.

D. L. Fourt and R. E. Beverly then judged the cows while the men compared their estimates with those of the two extension men.

R. E. Beverly, Idaho state representative, gave a splendid talk on cattle and pigs that he registration. He advised the dairymen to pay particular attention to their cattle and pigs for them in a manner that would not affect their registration rights.

The supply and demand of Holsteins in Idaho was the subject of a talk by R. C. Davis, state president, who stated that the supply of Holsteins in Idaho was not sufficient for the demand. He urged the dairymen toward concentrating their breeding.
