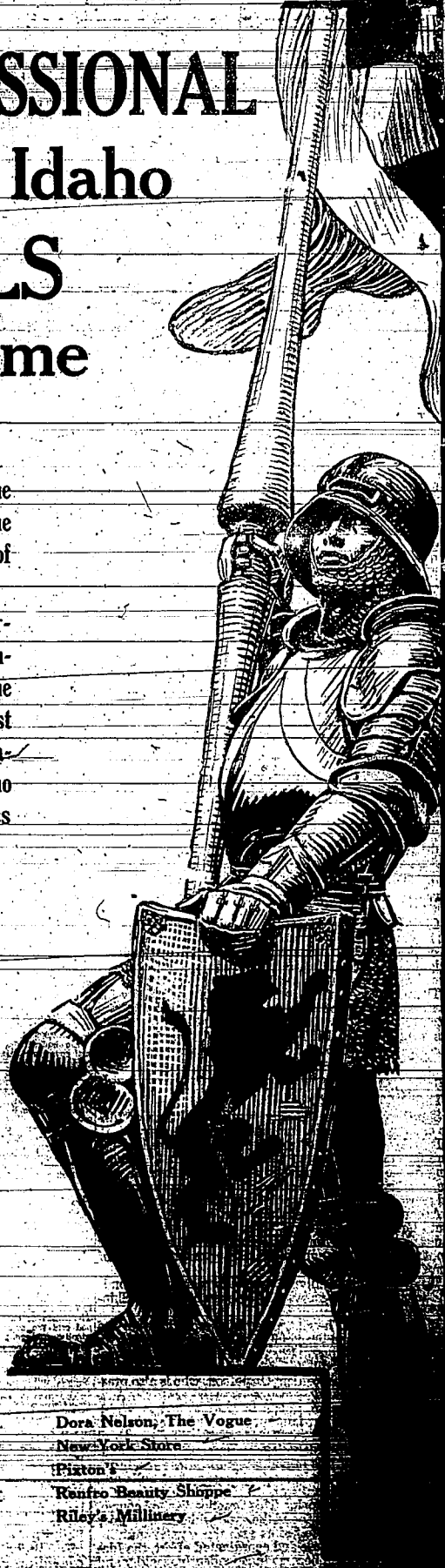
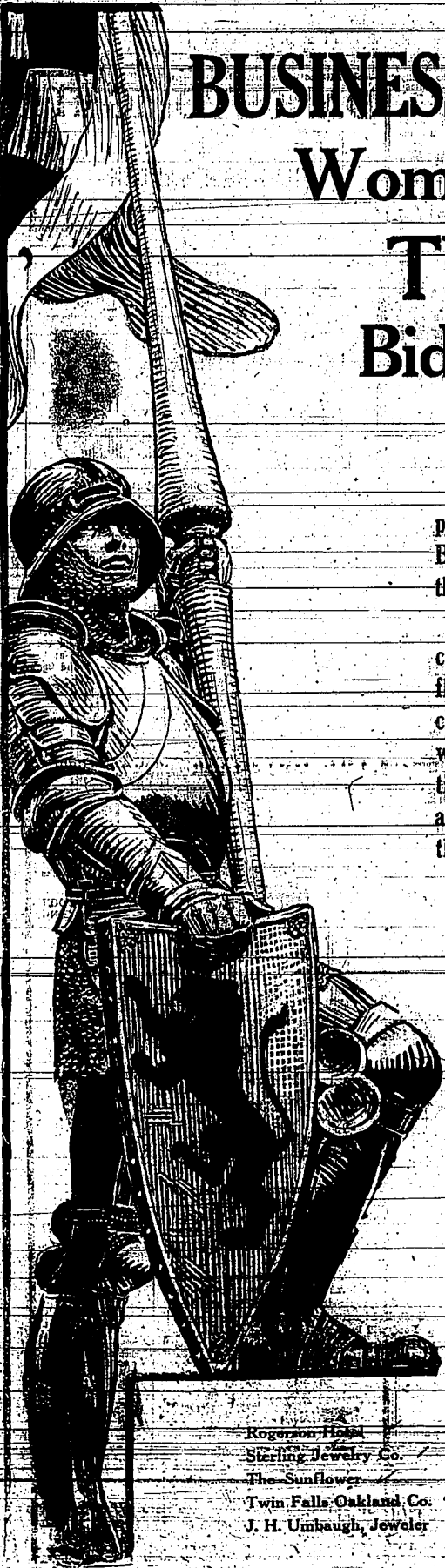

BETTER BUSINESS WOMEN FOR A BETTER BUSINESS WORLD.

Eleven years ago, a small group of active and prominent business women met to initiate a national federation of all the State organizations which had sprung up among the women engaged in business and the professions all over the country.

The organization was named the Business and Professional Women's Club. During the first few years attention was focused on membership additions, but so rapidly did the idea spread that the matter now takes care of itself by the law of natural accretion and the committee of the club devote their efforts to answering the question, "What is the Federation going to do?"

The answer is being adequately given year by year. And so great has the growth become that its voice is heard in every quarter.

The organization is concerned solely with business and professional women. It is pledged to forward their interests and the foremost need is economic.

The first startling truth developed was that women are not self supporting in the real sense of the word. "They met their current expenses, but out of the incomes they received they were unable to finance the untoward expenses of illness and old age. This had come about through the early attitude of underhiding men; and the Federation early took the stand of "equal training, equal pay for equal work."

So the organization now stands for a full high school education for every business woman, with scholarship funds to make that possible. The health committee stresses regular habits, right diet, exercise and play which makes for greater business efficiency. The slogan which animates individual members, local clubs and national Federation is: "Better Business Women for a Better Business World."

The Twin Falls club, first organized as a study class, early found that the wider aspect presented by the national Federation better met their needs and merged their activities into it. Since that time the growth has been steady and their place in the community that of good Americans as well as business women who are interested in promoting the business interests of women.

Civic matters have always met with quick and efficient response; for there is always the consciousness that if the objectives are to be achieved, every club must cut a straight clean trail through the community—and that the same community must be made to move forward.

Twin Falls is honored in being the convention city for this splendid group of business women of Idaho. City and State are proud to be the hosts to the national president, Miss Lena Madess Phillips, herself a distinguished citizen as well as the chosen head of the great organization.

SUBSTANTIAL BASIS FOR IDAHO'S POTATO INDUSTRY.

Standardization is the only practical solution of Idaho's extensive and highly important potato industry. It is this same rule of standardization, backed by co-operation, that enables the California growers to make a living in the raising of oranges and lemons; English walnuts, poultry and all the other State-wide products that find a profitable market in other parts outside the State.

According to Fred Gustafson, president of the Idaho Potato Growers' Association, there are about three thousand carloads of very fine Idaho potatoes still sorted away in potato cellars throughout the State, practically all of them first grade.

The question naturally arises: "Where are the seconds and the culls?" The answer is obvious and easy—"Shipped."

If Idaho had to have some surplus crop this year the potatoes should have been culls and seconds—instead we have about three thousand carloads that cannot be used before the new crop will be here.

As for a remedy, President Gustafson, who is also president of the State Seed Show and a member of the Ass'n. Board of Blackfoot, points to the absolute necessity for co-operation, calling attention to the recent conference of potato growers in Pocatello which finally organized what is known as the Idaho Potato Bureau, Incorporated. It is the purpose of this organization to induce the farmers to grade their stock in marked bags so that culls and smaller sizes under No. 1s will not be palmed off on the public as high-grade stock. This practice has, of course, reacted unfavorably on the Idaho spud which is a premier production and is recognized as such the country over.

With unity of purpose and coordinated effort, the Idaho potato growers can become independently wealthy and at the same time provide the markets of this country with the best potato grown anywhere.

WHAT IT COST TO RUN STATE IDAHO IN 1927

Margin of \$331,863 Shown By Statement of Receipts and Expenditures.

BOISE, May 21.—Disbursements of the State of Idaho for the year 1927 amounted to \$7,991,726.37 and receipts for the same amounting to \$8,323,589.45. It is shown in a report submitted to the office of the State Auditor by the Idaho State Chamber of Commerce.

General fund receipts totaled \$2,008,221 of which \$1,252,929.29 came from taxes and license revenue collected by counties. Special fund receipts such as gasoline tax, federal money for highways, land rentals, proceeds from bond sales, etc., amounted to \$755,290.

The budget classification of "general government" spent \$28,862,62.64 and revenue for this purpose other than taxation, amounted to \$281,814.40. "Protection to persons and property" cost \$22,223.23 and the title of \$24,417.91 from other sources than taxation, more than offset this figure.

Development and conservation of natural resources" cost \$16,786.63 and revenue from this source for the purpose amounted to \$430,176.78.

Disbursements for "health and sanitation" totaled \$1,100,000.00. Receipts for this purpose amounted to \$1,100,000.00.

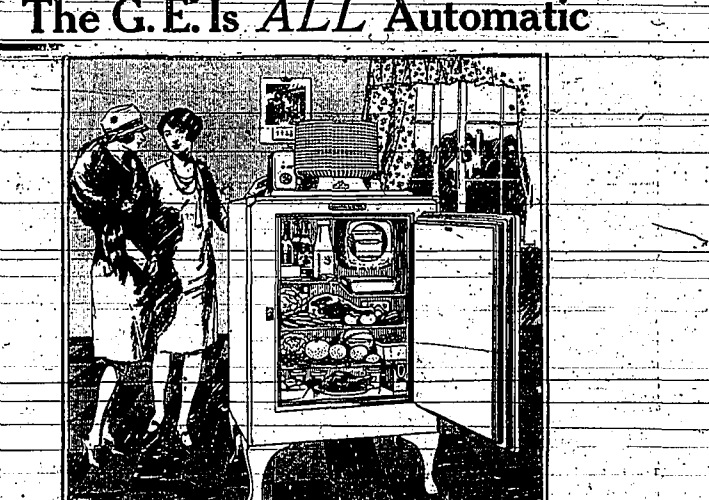
