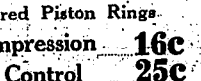

STRENGTHEN THE TIE BETWEEN THE MAN AND THE BOY.

A Twin Falls father was overheard the other day to exclaim: "My but that boy of mine is a problem!"

There are undoubtedly fathers in places other than Twin Falls who have said the same thing and thought the same thoughts.
The average boy is not a "problem"; he is a human being, possessed of keen intuition, a remarkable ability at appraisal of motives and action and a capacity for friendship, fellowship and love that is perfectly astounding.

Not one boy in a thousand wants his father's money without rendering some service but he does want and he needs help and encouragement. He desires confidences and friendship; he is entitled to sympathetic interest and his Dad, if he is wise, will be more than a father—he will be a buddy, a pal, a partner who can share victories and defeats, understanding the eager spirit of the lad to whom the world is still an open field.

Possibly one thing as much as any other needed by the boys of today is vocational guidance. Here in our own high school we have hundreds of boys who would have the privilege of making known their hopes and aspirations in life. And that brings to mind a successful enterprise of the Rotary Club members in the city of Brisbane, Australia, who grouped themselves in pairs for the purpose of interviewing boys of school leaving age. These men have been giving two nights a week each month to interviewing boys, in this having the active and sympathetic assistance of the school officials.

(1) Ideals of community service and good citizenship.
(2) That monetary advancement is secondary to the great fundamental of honest effort.
(3) The great satisfaction of honest effort and its relation to the community's good.
(4) The importance of not only choosing a right calling but the immediate commencement of studies in that direction.
(5) The necessity of the continuation of study after leaving school.

During her address to the Business and Professional Women's convention and convention Miss Phillips stated that the paid membership is now 49,000 and a new 1929-1930 year plan is to have a growing membership for the year. Clubs must be active and they have not but advertising what they may properly claim.
