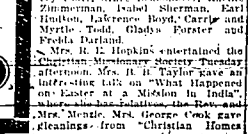

Premier Poincare Tells Chamber of Deputies How To Stabilize Franc

Paris, June 7.—Clear but guarded indication of his intention to stabilize the franc was given by Premier Poincare today in his inaugural declaration to the newly elected Chamber of Deputies.

"If we wish soon to put our money in a healthy and stable position," Poincare said, "if we wish to give official stability, if we wish to prepare without too much economic disturbance to end the present forced rate and convert paper money into gold, we must gather all our forces."

Poincare then warned parliament of its obligations regarding the coming operations.

"Nothing will have been done, but rather everything will be undone," the premier continued, "if after measures have been taken by parliament the budgetary balance is not restored completely. If our balance of trade becomes unfavorable, if un-

employment abroad, if in the inevitable adjustment of prices and so forth there is not exercised every moment of vigilance, if we do not have a firm intention that leaves nothing to chance, there is sure to be disaster."

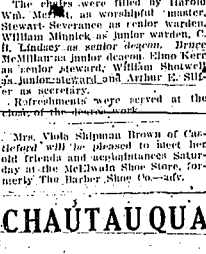

COUNTRY'S RAILROADS ARE MAKING A GOOD SHOWING.

Remarkable progress has been made by the railroads of the United States since the year 1920 as revealed by statistics recently given space in The Railway Age. As a rule the railroads are not given very favorable consideration by platform and press so that when there is an opportunity to say a good word, that opportunity should not be thrust aside.

These comparative figures are interesting: In 1920, an average of 24 1/2 per cent of all freight locomotives were in bad order. In 1925 this had been reduced to 16.2 per cent, representing a gain of 33.8 per cent in condition of serviceable locomotives.

In 1920, an average of seven per cent of all freight cars in the country were in bad order. In 1925 this had been reduced to 5.9 per cent, representing a gain of 15.7 per cent of serviceable freight.

In 1920, the average distance traveled by a freight car was 25.1 miles per day. In 1925, this had been increased to 30.3 miles per day, a gain of 20.7 per cent in effectiveness of freight car movement.

In 1920, the average freight train was 36.6 cars. In 1925, this figure advanced to 46.5 cars, an increase of 27 per cent.

In 1920, the average freight train carried 708 tons of freight. In 1925, this increased to 778 tons, a gain of 9.9 per cent.

In 1920, car shortages were severe and costly. In 1925, with greatly increased traffic, car shortages were practically eliminated.

MAKING THE PENALTY FIT THE CRIME.

Speed fiends had better remain outside the Province of Quebec this summer unless they happen to be carrying around a fat pocket book.

One hundred good dollars plus costs is the penalty being exacted for excessive speed and reckless driving.

Those who have ever driven through that delightful section of eastern Canada will recall the winding routes and the narrow streets of the villages, these villages being built right up to the side of the streets in accordance with the old French custom. Therefore it is dangerous for children to venture out on the public highways, for traffic has increased so tremendously year after year, due to permanent road construction, that automobiles are to be seen by the thousands, most of them from the United States side of the international boundary.

A Montreal paper tells of the arrest of an autoist from Three Rivers who was caught exceeding the speed limit near the old city of Quebec. The luckless fellow was fined one hundred dollars to which was added an item of fifteen dollars for costs and on top of all this, cancellation of the driver's license for a term of one year.

That is going some, yet the Three Rivers man may have said to have escaped what might have been a fine of \$300 and costs. That seems a bit high, yet Quebec facing an evil, is determined to correct that evil, believing that the imposing of stiff fines will do the work effectively.

Coming home to Idaho, there is altogether too much speeding on some of the State highways, especially those surfaced with loose gravel, which material is a perpetual menace to the safety of motorists. Thanks to the oiling program under way, this menace is gradually being overcome, thus accomplishing several desirable purposes, elimination of dust, added safety for the motorist and prolongation of the life of the car through minimizing wear and tear on the mechanism.

Putting into practice something of value, the Rotarians of Buenos Aires, Argentina, have been devoting a number of meetings to plans for educational propaganda against the use of drugs which is threatening their city. Letters were sent to the Minister of War, and to public instructors, soliciting their cooperation. Posters have been printed pointing out the serious consequence of the drug habit. These have been placed in schools and all public institutions.

A joke is being told on a Twin Falls man, member of the legal profession, by the way that he came out of his office yesterday, went across the street and got into the back seat of his car where he waited full fifteen minutes before realizing that his wife was not driving that day. Looking about to see if anybody was watching him and believing that he had not been observed, he clambered over into the front seat and drove home. Another example of the force of habit.

Premier Poincare Tells Chamber of Deputies How To Stabilize France

PARIS, June 4.—Clem's bill regarding "indications" in his literature soon will stabilize the franc was given by Premier Poincare today in his ministerial declaration to the Chamber of Deputies. 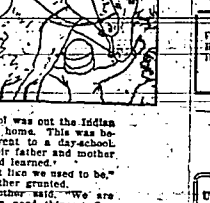
