FARMERS STAGE ANTI-HOOVER DEMONSTRATION

MARCH TO CONVENTION HALL BUT ARE DENIED ADMITTANCE

Banners and Placards Indicate Hostility to Nomination of
Commerce Secretary, Famous Mrs. Mabel Willebrandt;
Reads Report of Credentials Committee; Belief Ex-
pressed That Farmer Protest Will Shrink Before the
Coming of Election Day.

TODAY'S DEVELOPMENTS AT KANSAS CITY

CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 13.—Led by a hand in hand in sing "Maryland, My Maryland," overalls and "you see" hats, a mass of farmers marched on the Republican convention today to voice their protest against the nomination of Herbert Hoover.

They formed a line at the farm headquarters several blocks from the hall, paraded through the downtown streets, then plodded to arrive at the hall at 10 a.m.

While the farmers had no admission tickets, special parades have often been permitted to march around the convention hall during the sessions. The convention has the power to keep them out and the farmers had no assurance they would be admitted.

Marchers wore the badges of various anti-Hoover candidates, including many Lowden, Watson and Curtis badges.

Democrats, Anti-Hoover
Democrats and Progressives were all represented at Herbert Hoover.

Some 10,000 anti-Hoover Republicans—"Hoover looks easy for Smith." "This convention will not kill off the elephant," "make," "vote the Democratic ticket now."

"We don't want Hoover."
"You may nominate Hoover, but within the convention hall, delegates gathered in expectant knots, while the farmers were forming a picket line.

The hand regaled the early comers with slow music.

Meantime farmers had come to the hall.

The marchers were led by Ed Bush, candidate for Lieutenant-governor of Indiana. They tried to obtain admittance but were refused, whereupon Bush attacked the "Democrats."

"Bring the flag and we'll go inside anyhow."

Before they could get under way, however, they were stopped by a break in the convention hall, which made it evident they would resist with force any attempt to override their authority.

Out stepped Ed Nixon, old friend, and presented his pistol.

"We're all good Republicans," Bush said.

"I think Ed," Nixon replied, "that you can't afford to withdraw. It would demoralize our proceedings."

"Our farmers will resent this."

"I'm sorry, Ed, but I can't do it," Nixon replied.

Bush then went outside to break his fast, but was stopped by a break in the hall, which made it evident he would not be peaceful.

Called to Order.

WITNESS TELLS HOW UTILITIES GET USE WIRES

WASHINGTON, June 13.—William C. Gandy, attorney for the Federal Trade Commission, who is in Texas, yesterday described to the Federal Trade Commission methods followed by his employees in the public utility field.

Grant said he also was employed as a "travel editor" by the Associated Press, working as editor in the Dallas office, and had been told to look around in circuit public utility information over Associated Press wires.

One of Grant's activities started by him was to get more information about the utility companies, apparently brought a complaint from a Kansas City editor. A letter in which Grant defended the article and said why a Kansas City editor should "vote" else a "veto" over Texas utility news" was presented. The letter was addressed to an official of the Associated Press and added that it was "Dear H. R."

Grant said in his letter that Texas newspapers were getting more information about utility news every month and that Intered in the sale of the utility companies.

One of Grant's activities for his utility employees, admitted to the commission, said:

"While attending the American Legion convention in Cheyenne, Wyoming, (Grant) wired two stories each day to the Associated Press at Dallas for distribution in Texas papers, and while adding the street railways in Texas?"

Grant said his various letters to the utility companies were written in a friendly manner and were directed to them, but that the letters "might have had that effect."

Grant said one of his friends, Dr. W. E. Patterson, Texas state utility man, that he would "do" to help to put utility through the press association at any time.

"I am still connected with the Associated Press in the capacity of special writer and whenever I am writing a story put out for the press will start to do so," the letter said.

Another letter from Grant to the Associated Press, the legislature, Mississippi utility committee, explained the wire system of the press association and the advantage to distribute utility stories in the South.

The letter said the press association recently had opened offices in Oregon and California and that "We shall keep this in mind when we have some news originating here that would be of interest."

A letter in John Sharp, Mission, Texas, concerning the Inter-Coast Canal association's meeting, said:

"The association concerned now with the Associated Press for doing some work for them and would like to help you out in advertising their meetings."

Speakers' Program Part of Campaign Private Utilities

CASSVILLE, Mo., June 13.—New records in the field of private flying are expected to be established by "any" by an airplane now under construction which will be operated as a tourist device similar to the pony rides at the fairs in the recent tests on the Tucket-propelled Open automobile to Germany.

The new machine, which will weigh 100 pounds including the rocket engine, will be built by a group of young men who are in the middle of the new industry's propaganda campaign and large sums are spent in training and engaging lecturers to the public in the interests of the industry, the Federal Trade Commission has learned.

HOOVER EVIDENTLY THE REPUBLICAN LEADER.

Republicans evidently believe that Herbert Clark Hoover, the present Secretary of Commerce in the cabinet of President Calvin Coolidge, is the best fitted man to succeed Coolidge in the White House. A HIGHWAY PROJECT OF MUTUAL BENEFIT.

There should exist a paved highway between Twin Falls, Idaho, and Wells, Nevada, a distance of something like 125 miles, more or less.


